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FOREWORD

The Public Administration Act (R.S.Q., c. A-6.01) requires the Chair of the Conseil du trésor to table in the National Assembly the Expenditure Budget for all departments and agencies. This sets out the appropriations required over the course of the coming fiscal year, as well as the annual expenditure management plans developed by each of the ministers.

The Chair of the Conseil du trésor presents the 2006-2007 Expenditure Budget information to the National Assembly in four volumes:

- Volume I, *Estimates and Annual Expenditure Management Plans of the National Assembly and Persons Appointed by the National Assembly*, contains information on the National Assembly and persons such as the Public Protector, the Auditor General, the Chief Electoral Officer and the Lobbyists Commissioner who are designated by the National Assembly.
- Volume II, *Estimates of the Departments and Agencies*, contains estimates of all government appropriations for the 2006-2007 fiscal year. It distinguishes between the Expenditure Budget and the Capital Budget. Appropriations are broken down by portfolio and by program.
- Volume III, *Annual Expenditure Management Plans of the Departments and Agencies*, contains the yearly spending management plans developed by each of the ministers.
- Volume IV, *Message from the Chair of the Conseil du trésor and Additional Information*, begins with a message from the Chair and provides additional Expenditure Budget information.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE CONSEIL DU TRÉSOR

PROGRESS ON THE PATH TO SOUND, RESPONSIBLE MANAGEMENT

Our government promised rigorous, disciplined management of public finances and the 2006-2007 Expenditure Budget once again keeps that promise. In the past few years, we have acted with prudence and resolve, without deviating from our course. These efforts have enabled us to regain control over public spending while improving services. Thus we have:

- Turned the situation around in health and social services;*
- Made huge investments in education;*
- Begun modernizing the State and reducing its staff level; and*
- Reinvested in infrastructures so as to create a legacy that future generations may fully enjoy.*

In every area of government involvement, we have endeavoured to center government priorities on the essential needs of Québec society. This expenditure budget adheres to the budgetary discipline that is characteristic of our government and has produced these results. Hence for the fourth consecutive year, we are investing massively in health and education, yet without cutting back on public services and programs.

Our government is also staying the course on maintaining and upgrading public infrastructures. We are sticking to the asset maintenance rate announced last year. We are also adding new investments in public transportation, particularly to build the Mascouche-Montréal commuter train line and to replace the oldest Métro cars. We are continuing to invest in improving the quality of our transportation infrastructures, as well as in health, education, culture and research sectors.

This year we are embarking on a new set of measures to step up the transformation and modernization of the State, notably by introducing a rigorous framework for managing major projects based on a public-private partnership (PPP) approach with prior preparation of a business case to ensure that real cost is known before any work begins, thereby avoiding cost overruns such as those with the Laval Métro and the Gaspésia plant. This management approach is based on a comprehensive planning process as well as best practices.

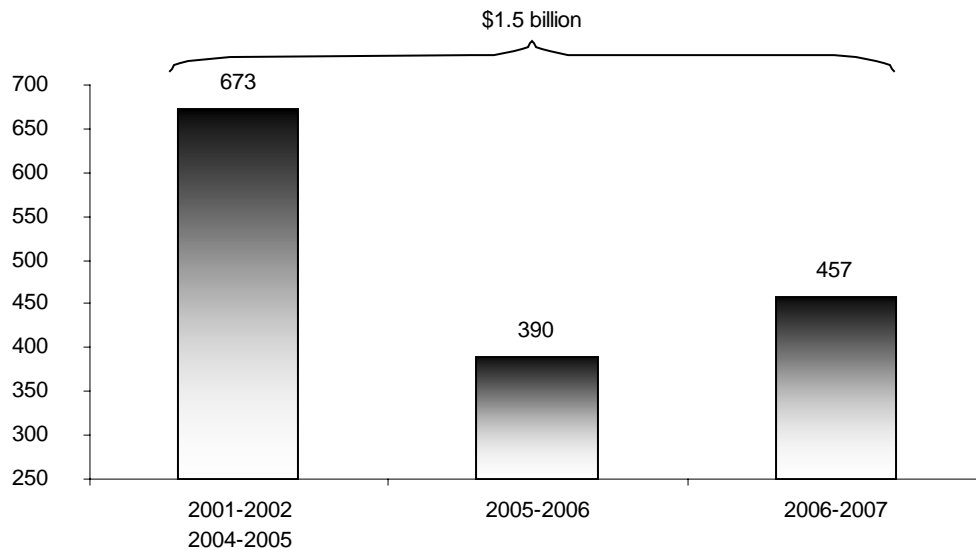
The delivery of public services will be improved in 2006 by the deployment of Services Québec and ongoing implementation of e-Government. Finally, we are continuing to shrink government by attaining the demanding objective we had set for 2005-2006, i.e. a reduction of 1,110 staff positions, basically by only replacing one out of every two retirees. For 2006-2007, we anticipate a further reduction of 1,211 positions, bringing the total cutback in the government staff level to 3,721 since the plan was announced in 2004.

1. \$1.5 BILLION FOR PAY EQUITY

As every successive Québec government over the past 40 years has found out, negotiations with the public and parapublic sector are always arduous. The stakes are high and the amounts involved, enormous. The latest round of negotiations was no different. Ultimately, we had to act responsibly by putting Québec's interests and taxpayers' capacity to pay first. We will continue to do that this year by settling, I hope, the issue of pay equity for which large amounts have been set aside since 2004-2005 based on the proposals we made to the various pay equity committees involved. On an annual basis, these proposals represent a yearly adjustment of over \$450 million, or the equivalent of 2% of the government's total payroll.

In all, \$1.5 billion has been set aside pending settlement of the pay equity issue. The \$673 million from fiscal years 2001-2002 to 2004-2005 was included in the 2004-2005 results. Moreover, a \$390-million provision was allocated in 2005-2006 and an additional \$457-million provision is itemized as a 2006-2007 expenditure. These substantial amounts are in addition to the 2% pay-scale indexation effective April 1, 2006, which also represents an annual expenditure of \$450 million. It is worth noting that nearly 95% of these pay increases and the funds earmarked for pay equity will go to the health and social services and education sectors.

(in millions of dollars)



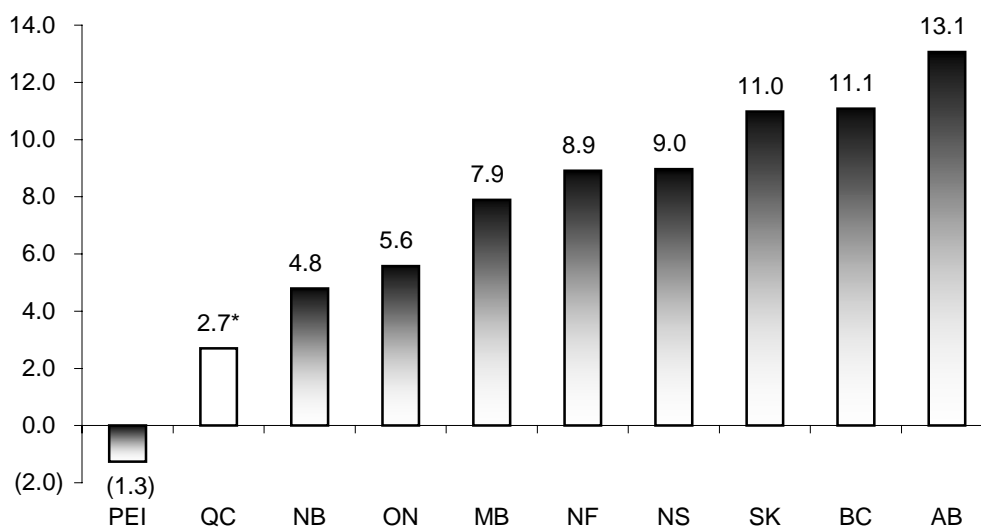
Note: Amounts based on the proposals tabled by the Gouvernement du Québec with pay equity committees, which, on an annual basis, represent 2% of the government's total payroll. Under the provisions of the Pay Equity Act, the government can gradually adjust pay scales over a four-year period. This results in a total of \$673 million for the period ranging from 2001-2002 to 2004-2005.

2. RIGOROUS BUDGETARY DISCIPLINE THAT PRODUCES RESULTS

□ **2.7% growth in program spending in 2005-2006**

Program spending in 2005-2006 amounts to \$48,940 million, or 2.7% more than in 2004-2005. This year Québec is again doing better than the rest of Canada in controlling its budget. In fact, only in Prince Edward Island is program spending growth slower than in Québec.

□ **3.9% growth in 2006-2007**

The government will adhere to a tight budget in 2006-2007. Program spending will increase by \$1,933 million, or 3.9%, to a total of \$50,873 million¹.

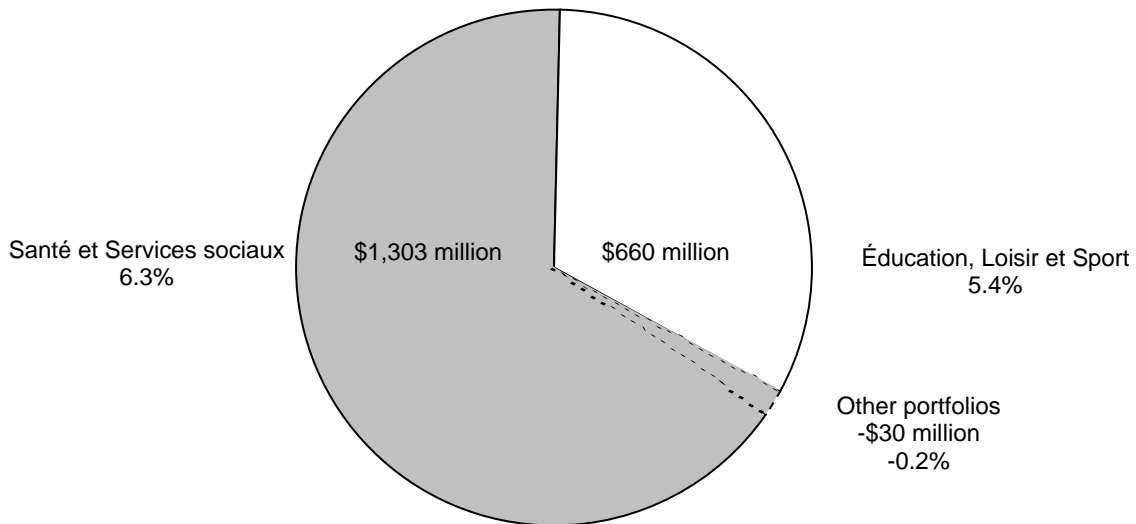
¹ Excluding \$390 million set aside for pay equity in 2005-2006 and \$457 million in 2006-2007, program spending is growing by 3.8% in 2006-2007.

Top priorities: Health and Education

In 2006-2007, 67% of the growth in program spending, or \$1,303 million, is budgeted for health and social services, whose budget will rise by 6.3% in 2006-2007. The Ministère de l'Éducation, du Loisir et du Sport will also have a substantial increase of \$660 million, or 5.4%. The budgets for the other portfolios will remain relatively stable, declining by a modest 0.2%.

□ **Santé et Services sociaux: \$4.2 billion in additional funds over four years**

True to our word, our government has injected \$4.2 billion more into the budget for health and social services since we took office, mainly to shorten waiting times, eliminate overcrowded emergency rooms, and introduce new services.

The size of this reinvestment reflects the extent to which health and social services sector has been a key component of the government action in the past three years. This unprecedented effort is producing significant positive results both in terms of the number of services provided and access to them. This year we are going even farther by guaranteeing patients swift access to elective surgery within minimal timeframes as my colleague the Minister of Health and Social Services recently announced.

The budget allocated for the Ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux in 2006-2007 will also enable the Department to continue work it has begun in the past few years, including implementation of its action plans for seniors facing loss of autonomy and for mental health.

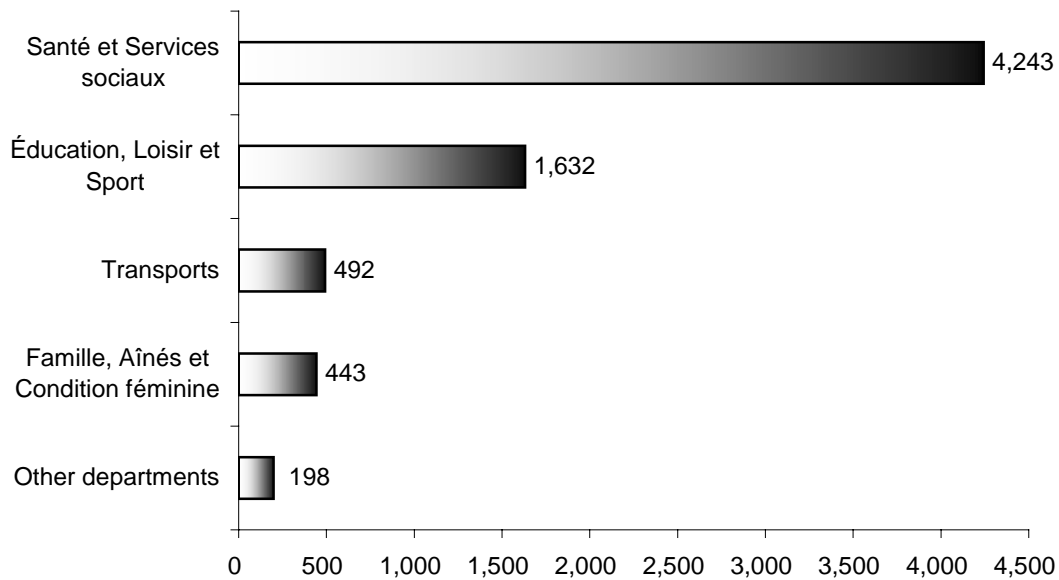
□ ***Éducation, Loisir et Sport: An additional \$1.6 billion over four years***

Since taking office, we have made academic success a priority. For this, we have added \$1.6 billion to the budget of the Ministère de l'Éducation, du Loisir et du Sport between 2003-2004 and 2006-2007. That's more money in four years, than the total growth in the budget for education in the nine years preceding our election.

The 5.4% budget increase in 2006-2007 will enable the Department to undertake major new initiatives, which include adding an hour and a half a week of English and Physical Education classes at the primary, as well as specialized primary and secondary school staff for disabled children and those with learning or adjustment difficulties.

□ **Other departmental budgets remain essentially the same in 2006-2007**

The expenditure budget for the other portfolios remains relatively stable in 2006-2007, shrinking slightly by 0.2 % overall. Yet some departments will have a substantially larger budget:

- *The budget of the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications is 8.5% higher, mainly to finance La Grande Bibliothèque and assist museums in financial difficulty;*
- *The Ministère des Transports is receiving an 8.0% increase as part of the considerable investment in Québec roads that began three years ago;*

- *The budget for the Ministère de la Famille, des Aînés et de la Condition féminine is increased by 6.8%, contributing to fund 200,000 reduced-contribution childcare places and salary upgrades for daycare workers;*
- *An additional 4.8% is allocated for Affaires municipales et des Régions, including \$29 million to renew the fiscal pact with municipalities with full indexation;*
- *The Immigration et des Communautés culturelles budget is 5.7% higher due to a \$5.7-million allocation for the accreditation of foreign diplomas, as well as francization and integration of immigrants;*
- *The budget of the Ministère de l'Agriculture, des Pêcheries et de l'Alimentation rises by 2.6%, primarily due to an increase in property-tax refunds to farmers.*

Other departments

The budgets of the other departments have been drawn up with a view to maintaining public services. To achieve this, rationalization has essentially been applied to operating expenses through the use of measures such as reducing the government staff level by attrition and adopting a new management framework for informational resources.

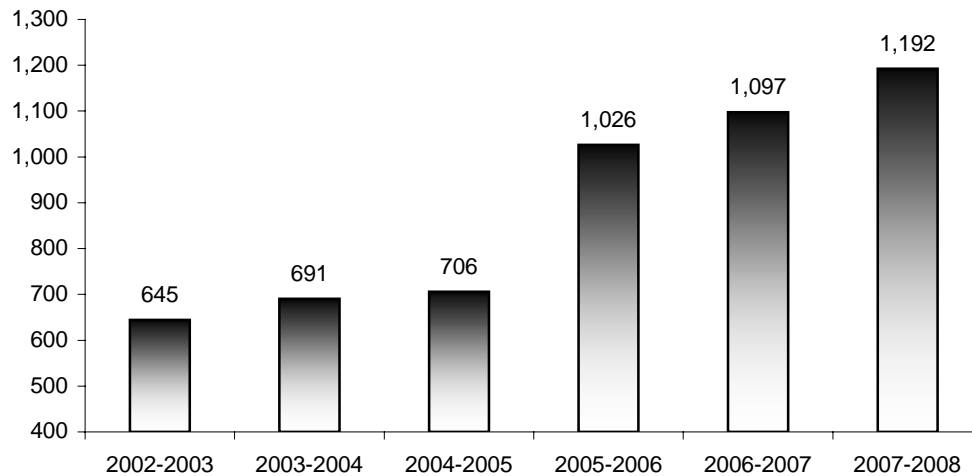
3. CONTINUE UPGRADING PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURES

Upgrading public infrastructures ranks among the major reforms introduced by our government. In the past three years we have made unprecedented investments in the construction of new facilities and restoration of public infrastructures, primarily in the areas of health and social services, education, transportation, municipal affairs, culture, and research.

In this regard, in tabling the 2005-2006 Expenditure Budget, I announced a new policy designed to ensure the maintenance of government assets. It aims to bring infrastructure preservation in line with generally accepted standards in North America. Thus hospitals and educational institutions will have an annual envelope equivalent to 2.0% of the value of their property to keep it in good condition. The health sector is receiving an additional 1.0% for functional renovations.

I am proud today to confirm the continuation of this policy. For the first time in Québec, a government is giving asset maintenance a higher priority. In total, investment in asset maintenance will rise from \$706 million in 2004-2005 to almost \$1.2 billion in 2007-2008. In comparison to the period preceding our arrival in government, the budget for asset maintenance in 2007-2008 will be close to double what it was in 2002-2003.

 (Asset-maintenance budgets in millions of dollars)¹

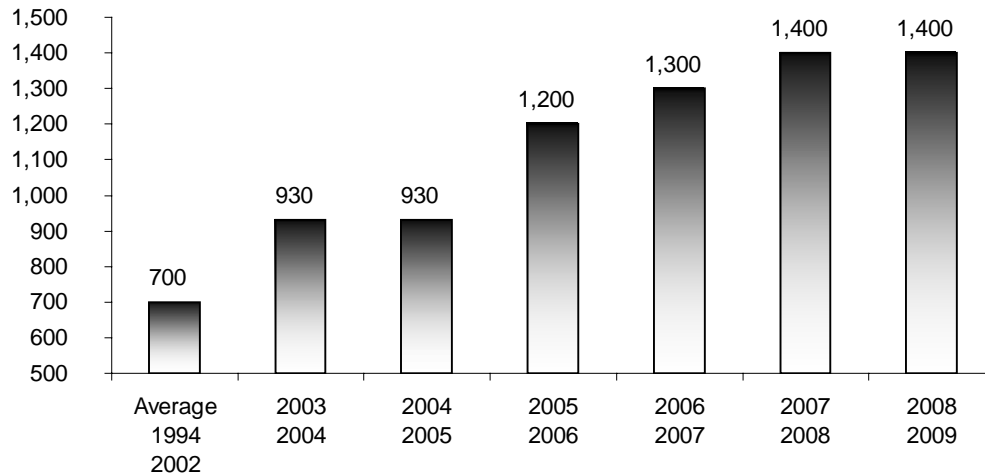

□ **Confirmation of the roadwork budget on a triennial basis**

In the case of road infrastructures, as promised, our government will this year invest \$1.3 billion, or \$100 million more than last year. Investment envelopes of \$1.4 billion in 2007-2008 and 2008-2009 are also confirmed. Confirmation of the budget for roadwork on a triennial basis will henceforth enable the Ministère des Transports to do better public works planning with the industry.

□ **Public transportation: New investments totalling \$1.5 billion**

Public transportation infrastructures are vital for urban economic development and the attainment of our greenhouse-gas emission reduction goals. We are therefore allocating close to \$1.5 billion spread over the next few years to restore the Montréal Métro, replace the oldest cars commissioned in the 1960s, and improving commuter train service primarily by building a new link between Mascouche - Montréal.

□ **New infrastructures for health and social services**

In 2006-2007, \$485 million will be invested in carrying out priority projects in health and social services establishments. The funds will go mainly towards hospital and long-term care facility construction and renovation projects, improvements to emergency rooms and the acquisition of new medical equipment, including radiation oncology and radiology apparatus.

Funds will also be allocated for homecare projects for seniors losing their autonomy and for the Health Infoway project, which involves computerizing the health system.

Considering the authorized appropriations of slightly more than \$1.2 billion in 2004 and 2005 and the \$430 million over three years earmarked for asset maintenance that was announced in the 2005-2006 Expenditure Budget, the investments in health and social services infrastructures approved over the past three years total more than \$2 billion.

□ ***Investments in educational infrastructures***

In the realm of educational facilities, new projects totalling \$302 million will be undertaken in 2006 in addition to the \$362 million for projects approved in 2004 and 2005. These new projects mainly involve converting secondary-school science laboratories within the context of the school reform, updating vocational and technical training programs, various repairs, and expanding universities, which includes construction of a First Nations Building at the Université du Québec en Abitibi-Témiscamingue.

□ ***Culture and Communications: \$58 million in investments***

New investments in culture will total \$58 million in 2006-2007. These initiatives primarily involve the restoration and preservation of Québec's religious heritage, which is particularly valuable, as well as cultural facilities.

□ ***Research***

An amount of \$196 million will be invested in scientific research, mainly in projects funded by the Canada Foundation for Innovation.

4. PROGRESS IN MODERNIZING THE STATE

Modernizing the State is one of our government's priorities. In this regard, a 2005 independent study entitled "Citizens First" found that, among all 78 services rated, those provided by the Québec government generally earned the highest score, very often surpassing those obtained by federal and municipal administrations, as well as some private-sector services. The Québec government accounted for seven out of the ten services that received the highest ratings from Quebecers.

Adopting new ways of doing things is one approach that is favoured for improving the quality of public services. In this regard, the introduction of a new framework for managing major infrastructure projects, the launch of Services Québec, the ongoing work towards e-Government and reducing the size of government, will radically change how the government's work is organized and services are delivered to the public.

□ A new management framework for major public works

In recent years, major public projects in Québec have all too often unfortunately ended with huge cost overruns. Construction of the Métro extension to Laval and the Gaspésia plant in Chandler are prime examples of this. Precisely to prevent the recurrence of such events, in 2006 we are introducing a new management framework for major projects based on prior preparation of a comprehensive business case. This approach, which is mandatory for undertaking public works on a PPP basis, demands more rigour and transparency than conventional planning, thereby making it possible to avoid cost overruns. That is why most Western countries and Canadian provinces now prefer this process to the conventional procedure for carrying out public infrastructure projects.

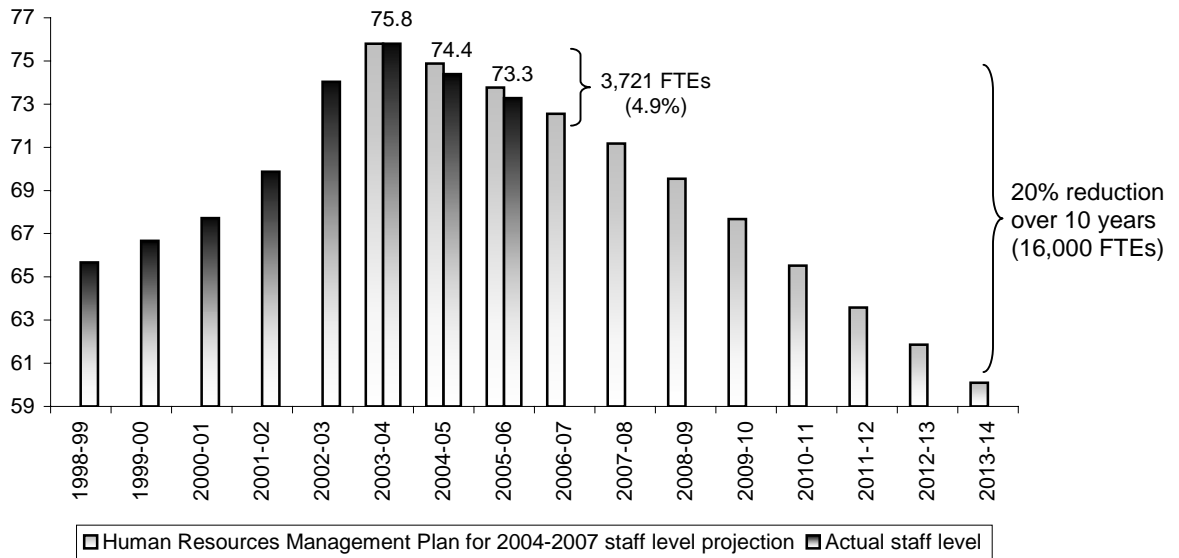
□ **Improving the delivery of public services**

Services Québec is a multiservice center that will make it easier for individuals and enterprises interested in obtaining government information or services. Various government services will gradually be incorporated into the new agency, and Services Québec will open its first offices in 2006. In the short term, priority will be given to introducing a single phone number for reaching the government, along with developing portals for e-Government service delivery.

□ **Reducing the size of government: target attained for the second year in a row**

For the second year in a row, we are attaining our goal of reducing the government staff level through attrition with a net reduction of 1,110 staff positions. In the fiscal year that begins this coming April 1, we will aim for a new reduction of 1,211 positions which, added to the decrease of 1,400 positions achieved in 2004-2005, amounts to a total reduction of 3,721 positions since May 2004, or almost 5% of the government total staff level. When this plan is fully implemented in 2013-2014, the government staff level will have been reduced by 16,000 positions, or 20% of its size.

Overall, so far these measures and the efforts made to reduce the government's operating costs have resulted in \$500 million in cumulative savings which have been used to improve public services.

5. CONCLUSION

The 2006-2007 Expenditure Budget sustains the efforts initiated in previous budgets. It aims for sound, responsible management of public finances. Considerable energy has gone into curbing growth in public spending and keeping it in line with what taxpayers can afford to pay.

Yet this sound, responsible management has not been at the expense of public services. Quite the opposite is true: we have actually improved public services. In health and education alone, our government has allocated close to an additional \$6 billion in funds since 2003. We are all the more proud that these new investments have been made at the same time as we have set aside a total of \$1.5 billion to settle the pay equity issue.

We have managed to balance spending controls with reinvestments in priority areas mainly because of the work towards modernization we began in 2004. Thus the reduction in the size of government and measures aimed at reducing government operating expenses have saved us half a billion dollars to date. These cumulative savings will continue to grow in step with the staff level reduction called for in the Human Resources Management Plan for 2004-2007.

The approach we have taken, based on sound management, optimal use of resources, and efforts to rationalize operating expenses, has enabled us to reinvest substantial amounts in what Quebecers consider most important.

This same approach of discipline and sound management leads us to assign priority to the maintenance of public infrastructures, particularly in the health and social services, education and transportation sectors. This policy, which is not only being continued but stepped up this year, reflects our intention of preserving our assets and acting responsibly today so that we leave future generations public infrastructures they can take pride in.

This budget lays the groundwork for attaining new objectives. We can now look to the future with more confidence, knowing that our spending is in line with our capacity to pay, and based on our priorities. By continuing our efforts at modernization – especially through the development of public-private partnership projects – we will gain additional room to manoeuvre and ultimately enjoy the results of our full collective potential. More than ever before, we can move forward!

CHAPTER 1

2006-2007 EXPENDITURE BUDGET

IN BRIEF

- ❑ Program spending amounts to \$50,873.0 million in 2006-2007, while debt service will amount to \$7,205.0 million, thus actual government expenditures are pegged at \$58,078.0 million for 2006-2007.
- ❑ Program spending grows by 3.9%, \$1,933.0 million more than in 2005-2006.
- ❑ This entire increase is allocated to the Government's priorities, health and education:
 - \$1,302.5 million to the "Santé et Services sociaux" portfolio;
 - \$660.0 million to the "Éducation, Loisir et Sport" portfolio.
- ❑ The expenditure budget for the other portfolios remains relatively stable, with a slight decrease of 0.2%.
- ❑ The weight of program spending in the Québec economy, which was at 17.7% in 2005-2006, has once again dropped this year, to 17.6%.

2006-2007 Expenditure Budget

In 2006-2007, total government expenditures amount to \$58,078.0 million:

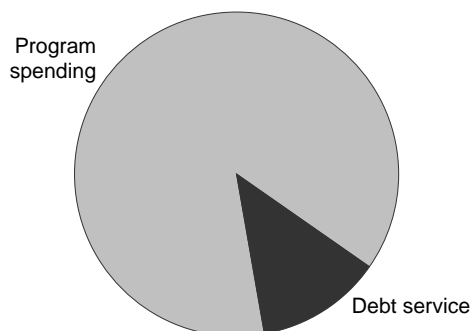
- An amount of \$50,873.0 million is allocated to program spending;
- The debt service represents \$7,205.0 million.

Program spending has grown by 3.9% compared to 2005-2006, while the debt service has increased by 5.2%, for a total expenditure growth of 4.1%.

- The growth of \$356.0 million in the debt service, which includes the direct debt service and interest on pension plans, is largely attributable to the forecast increase in interest rates.

For every dollar of Government revenue in 2006-2007, nearly 88 cents will be used to fund program costs and over 12 cents to fund the debt service cost.

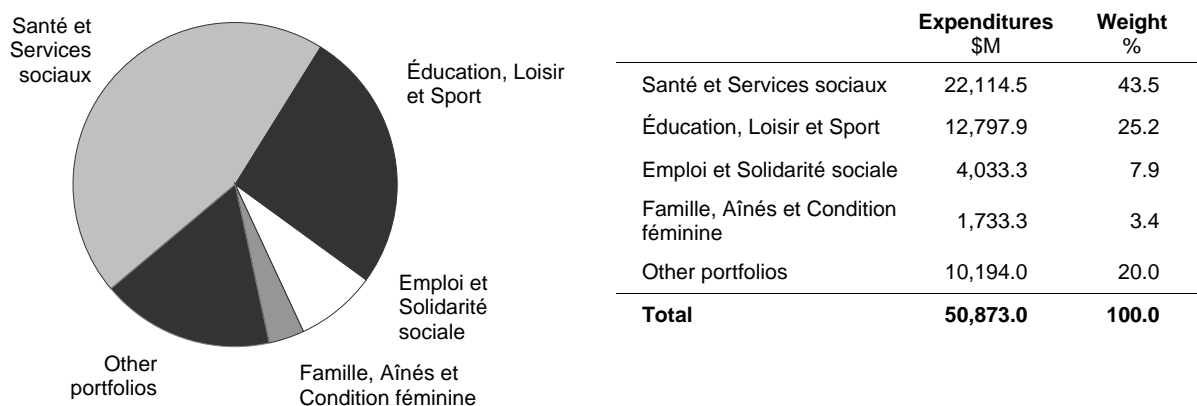
Four portfolios account for 80.0% of the 2006-2007 program spending:

- The “Santé et Services sociaux” portfolio, with a budget of \$22,114.5 million, represents 43.5% of program spending;
- The “Éducation, Loisir et Sport” portfolio, with a budget of \$12,797.9 million, represents 25.2% of program spending;
- The “Emploi et Solidarité sociale” portfolio, with a budget of \$4,033.3 million, represents 7.9% of program spending. The mission of this portfolio is to promote employment, the development of manpower, a more efficient labour market, the fight against poverty and social exclusion, and to ensure financial support to persons who are socially disadvantaged;
- The “Famille, Aînés et Condition féminine” portfolio, with a budget of \$1,733.3 million, represents 3.4% of program spending. This portfolio ensures the consistency of government interventions affecting families, the elderly, and respect for women’s rights with a view to achieving equality between women and men.

The other portfolios, with expenditures totaling \$10,194.0 million, represent 20.0% of program spending and include mainly:

- \$1,957.0 million to the “Transports” portfolio, the mission of which is to ensure the movement of persons and merchandise by means of efficient and safe transportation systems that contribute to the sustainable development of Québec;
- \$1,847.4 million to the “Affaires municipales et Régions” portfolio, which ensures the implementation and maintenance of a quality living environment and municipal and supralocal services for all citizens, as well as the promotion of partnerships with various stakeholders in the area of regional development.

The expenditure budget totals \$50,873.0 million for the 2006-2007 fiscal year, which is 3.9% or \$1,933.0 million more than the 2005-2006 probable expenditure.

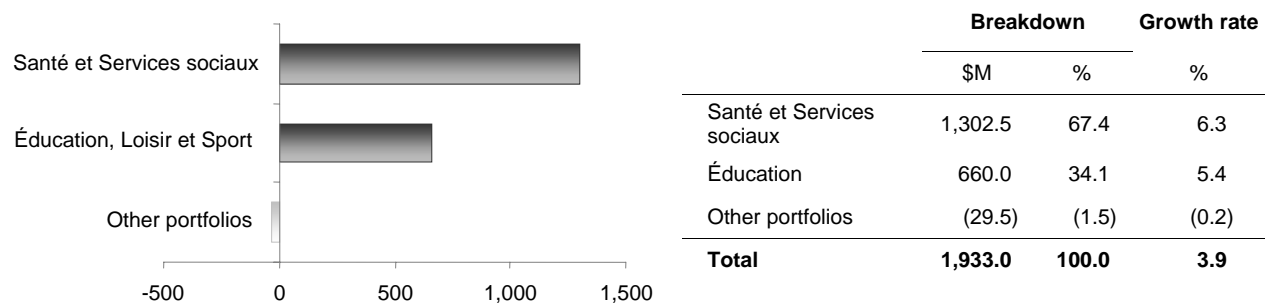
The growth allocated to health and education totals \$1,962.5 million, as follows:

- \$1,302.5 million to the “Santé et Services sociaux” portfolio, for a growth of 6.3% over 2005-2006, which represents 67.4% of the total growth in program spending in 2006-2007;
- \$660.0 million to the “Éducation, Loisir et Sport” portfolio, or 5.4% more than in 2005-2006, which represents 34.1% of the total growth in program spending in 2006-2007.

The expenditure budget for the other portfolios remains relatively stable in 2006-2007, with a small decrease of 0.2%, or \$29.5 million, compared to 2005-2006.

Santé et Services sociaux:**Expenditure Budget Increase of \$1,302.5 Million in 2006-2007**

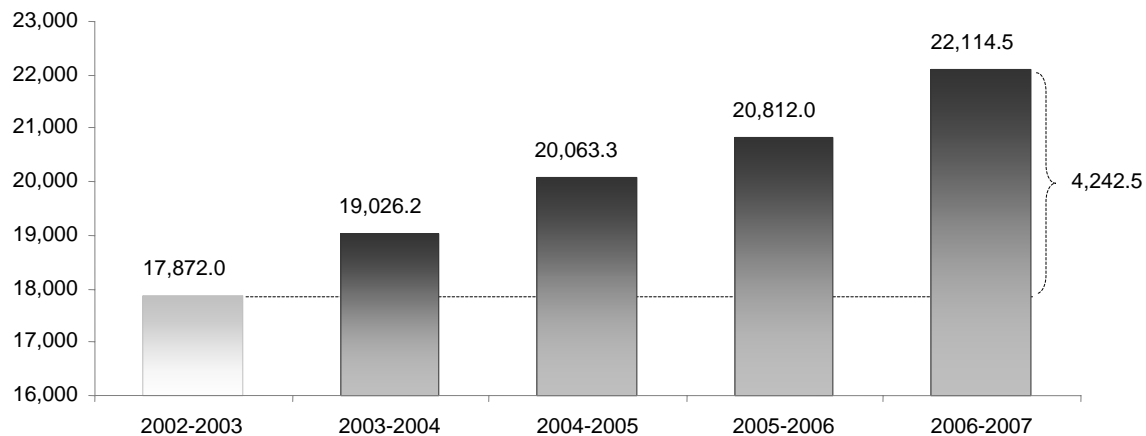
The growth allocated to the health and social services sector has reached \$4,242.5 million over the past four years, which accounts for just over 60.0% of the growth allocated to program spending over the same period.

In 2006-2007 alone, the growth allocated to this sector is \$1,302.5 million, 6.3% more than in 2005-2006, earmarked for:

- Funding the growth in program costs, including specific health system costs and the impact of pay equity. The increases in compensation granted to staff in the network and health professionals represent 67.3% of the total growth for 2006-2007;
- Proceeding with measures for the introduction of guaranteed access to hip, knee and cataract surgery;
- Increasing services to the dependent elderly, persons suffering from mental health problems and vulnerable persons.

Éducation, Loisir et Sport:

Expenditure Budget Increase of \$660.0 Million in 2006-2007

The expenditure budget allocated to education has increased by \$1,632.0 million in four years, which is nearly a quarter of the growth allocated to all program spending over the same period.

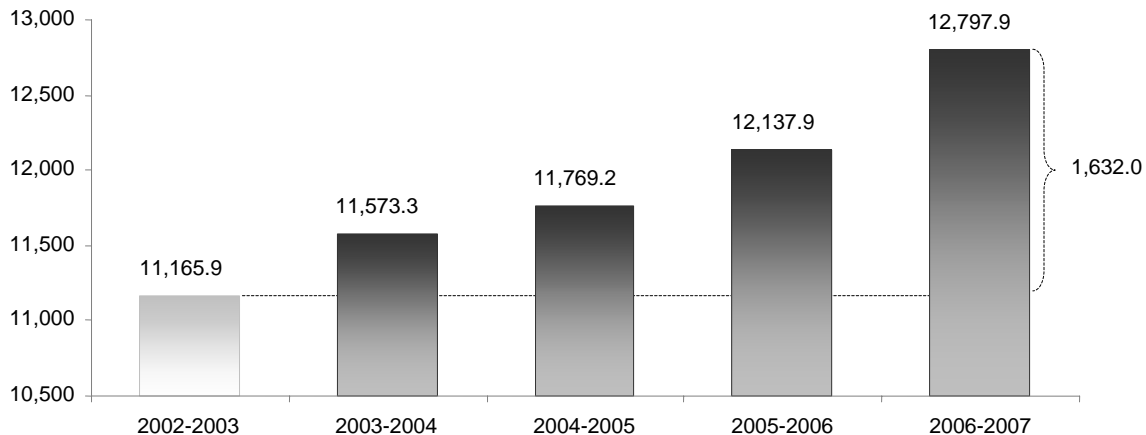
Expenditures on education amount to \$12,797.9 million in 2006-2007, for a growth of \$660.0 million or 5.4% over 2005-2006.

Additional amounts allocated to education will primarily serve to:

- Maintain the quality of services and the funding of the different growth factors in the networks;
- Add resources for students who are handicapped or have adjustment or learning difficulties and add resources pursuant to the 90-minute increase in teaching time per week at the elementary level;
- To fulfil the commitments made to students in regard to the financial assistance program. The addition for 2006-2007 totals \$42.5 million, which brings the total amount of the agreement with the students, in regard to reestablishing the level of bursaries over two years, to \$103.0 million for the 2006-2007 award year.

(in millions of dollars)



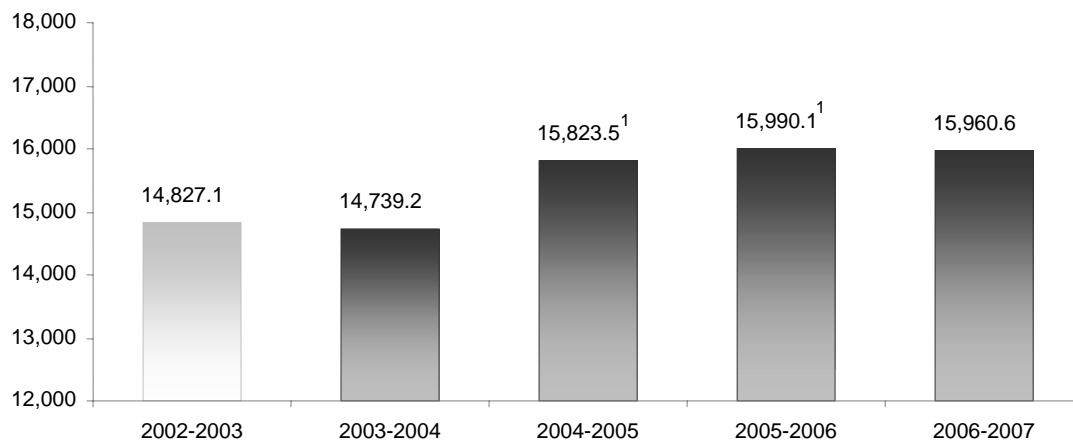
Other portfolios:**Overall Program Spending Remains at the 2005-2006 Level**

The budget allocated to the other portfolios in 2006-2007 totals \$15,960.6 million, which is a decrease of \$29.5 million or 0.2% compared to 2005-2006. However, some portfolios have a significant increase to take specific elements into account:

- \$145.7 million or 8.0% to the “Transports” portfolio, primarily due to an increase in the debt service related to road infrastructures, subsequent to investments in the road system;
- \$109.9 million or 6.8% to the “Famille, Aînés et Condition féminine” portfolio, primarily attributable to the appropriations required to annualize the reduced contribution children places that were developed during the 2005-2006 fiscal year and to the progression in salary scales;
- \$84.8 million or 4.8% to the “Affaires municipales et Régions” portfolio, mainly to fund the increase in transfers to municipalities under the Entente financière et fiscale entered into with municipalities and assistance to social, community and affordable housing;
- \$45.4 million or 8.5% to the “Culture et Communications” portfolio, including funding for the Grande bibliothèque and to help museums in financial difficulty.

(in millions of dollars)



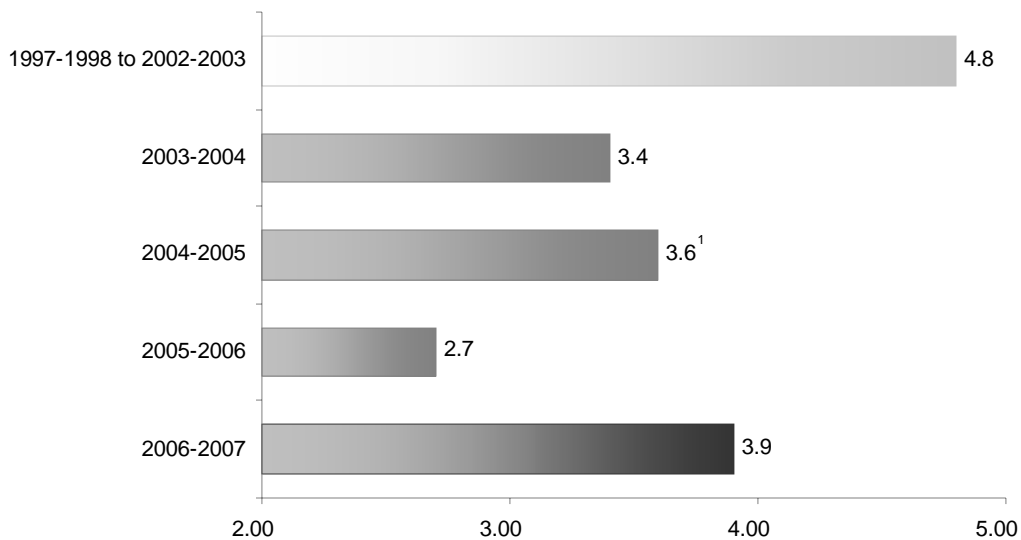

Appendix 1.1

Program Spending Growth Rate since 1997-1998

Over the past four years, the growth in program spending was below the average for the period ranging from 1997-1998 to 2002-2003, excluding the amount of \$673.0 million in 2004-2005 for the Pay Equity Provision, which covers the period from November 21, 2001 to March 31, 2005. The program spending growth rate in 2006-2007 is 3.9%.

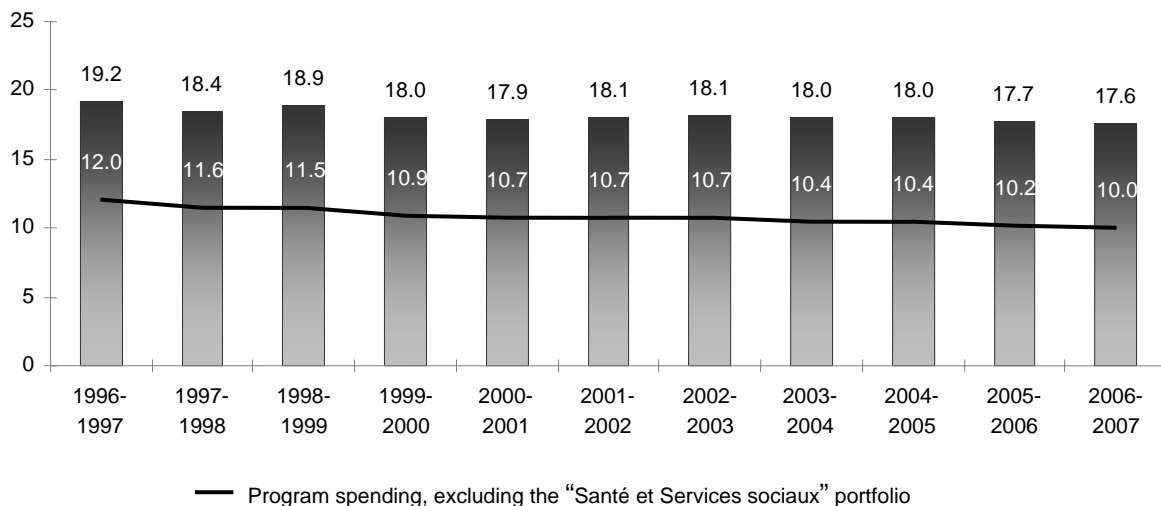

Evolution of Program Spending as a Percentage of Gross Domestic Product

The weight of program spending in the economy should be at 17.6% in 2006-2007, which represents a decrease of 0.1% compared to the 2005-2006 fiscal year.

If expenditures allocated to the “Santé et Services sociaux” portfolio were excluded, program spending as a percentage of GDP would be at 10.0% for 2006-2007.

CHAPTER 2

RESULTS FOR THE 2005-2006 FISCAL YEAR

IN BRIEF

- Total government expenditures for the 2005-2006 fiscal year should amount to \$55,789.0 million. They were revised upwards by \$387.0 million after the 2005-2006 Expenditure Budget was tabled, mainly as a result of the adjustments of various budgetary line items for some departments.
- Program spending stands at \$48,940.0 million, which is an increase of 2.7% over the previous fiscal year. Debt service is down 0.1% from the 2004-2005 fiscal year.

Variation in Government Expenditures in 2005-2006

Total government expenditures incurred during the 2005-2006 fiscal year should amount to \$55,789.0 million, which is an increase of \$1,280.5 million or 2.3% over the previous fiscal year.

Program spending is up 2.7% to \$48,940.0 million, versus \$47,655.3 million in 2004-2005.

Debt service stands at \$6,849.0 million, which is down 0.1% from 2004-2005.

Evolution in the 2005-2006 Total Expenditure Forecast

Total government expenditures should amount to \$55,789.0 million for the 2005-2006 fiscal year, which is an increase of \$387.0 million over the 2005-2006 Expenditure Budget total forecast.

Concerning program spending, the forecast in the previous budget of \$48,407.0 million is revised upwards to \$48,940.0 million, which is an increase of \$533.0 million, allocated as follows:

- \$258.0 million for the expenditure for the provision for bad debts at the Ministère du Revenu to reflect the recurrence of the revision to this provision in 2004-2005;
- \$82.0 million for the expenditure for the provision for losses from the financial intervention guaranteed at the Ministère du Développement économique, de l'Innovation et de l'Exportation to take into account the impact of the adjustments that will be made to the method used to establish this provision;
- \$100.0 million for public sector pension plans. This amount reflects the impact of the new estimate of the value of the actuarial obligations of the government;
- \$93.0 million for other factors, including the additional write-off of \$40.0 million in respect of the moneys invested in the GIRES project of the Ministère des Services gouvernementaux.

In addition, the forecast debt service is revised downwards by \$146.0 million. This decrease is due essentially to the strength of the Canadian dollar against the different currencies that make up the debt and lower than expected interest rates, compensated partly by the rise of the actuarial obligations of the government with regard to the retirement plans.

Evolution in Authorized Appropriations in 2005-2006

At the beginning of the fiscal year, the total appropriations presented to the National Assembly amounted to \$56,329.7 million, comprising \$49,334.7 million for program spending and \$6,995.0 million for debt service.

Permanent appropriations were \$120.2 million higher than projected at the beginning of the fiscal year. This increase is due to different variations that occurred during the fiscal year, including:

- An increase of \$258.0 million in the expenditure towards the provision for bad debts at the Ministère du Revenu;
- A decrease of \$146.0 million for debt service due essentially to the strength of the Canadian dollar against the different currencies that make up the debt and lower than expected interest rates, compensated partly by the rise of the actuarial obligations of the government with regard to the retirement plans.

The 2004-2005 appropriations actually carried over to 2005-2006 were \$87.6 million, which is \$45.2 million more than initially forecast.

CHAPTER 3

2006-2007 EXPENDITURE BUDGET BREAKDOWN BY MAJOR CATEGORY AND BENEFICIARY

IN BRIEF

- The Government's Expenditure Budget for 2006-2007 amounts to \$58,078.0 million, including \$50,873.0 million for program spending, or 87.6%, and \$7,205.0 million for debt service, or 12.4%.
- Health and education expenditures account for 68.6% of program spending, with the largest share paid to health and social service establishments as well as educational institutions.
- Support expenditures total \$11,133.4 million, half of which, or \$5,550.2 million, is intended for individuals through various programs such as the Homework Assistance Program, employment assistance measures and financial support for farmers.
- Remuneration expenditures total \$28,479.3 million, or 56.0% of program spending.

Expenditure Breakdown Overview

The Government's Expenditure Budget for 2006-2007 amounts to \$58,078.0 million, including \$50,873.0 million for program spending, or 87.6%, and \$7,205.0 million for debt service, or 12.4%.

Expenditure Breakdown by Supercategory

In 2006-2007, three quarters of the Government's total expenditures is allocated to "Transfer" expenditures and 12.4% to servicing the government debt.

The other supercategories, namely those related to operating expenditures and to special funds, make up 12.9% of total expenditures.

Volumes I and II of the Expenditure Budget contain a breakdown of expenditures for each portfolio by supercategory. Expenditures in the "Transfer supercategory are also broken down by category and by beneficiary and "Allocation to a Special Fund" are broken down by category.

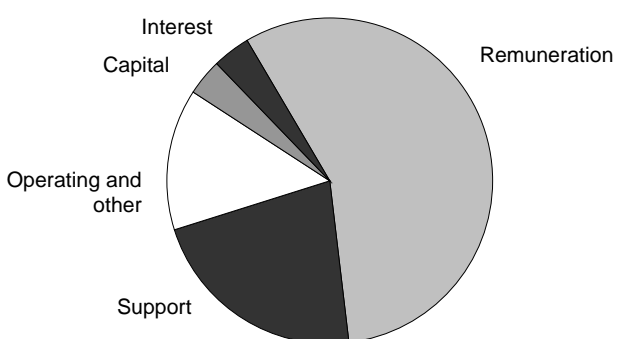
By category, the Government's program spending breaks down as follows:

- \$28,479.3 million, or 56.0%, for remuneration expenditures;
- \$11,133.4 million, or 21.9%, for support expenditures for individuals, businesses, public and parapublic agencies and other government partners;
- \$7,441.9 million, or 14.6%, for operating expenditures and other;
- \$2,086.9 million, or 4.1%, for capital expenditures;
- \$1,731.5 million, or 3.4%, for interest expenditures on the debt attributable to program spending.

The expenditure categories make it possible to present expenditures by type and relative importance. They are presented in Appendix 3.1.

Health and social service establishments, with \$15,500.6 million, as well as educational institutions, with \$12,392.2 million, together account for 54.9% of the program spending planned for 2006-2007.

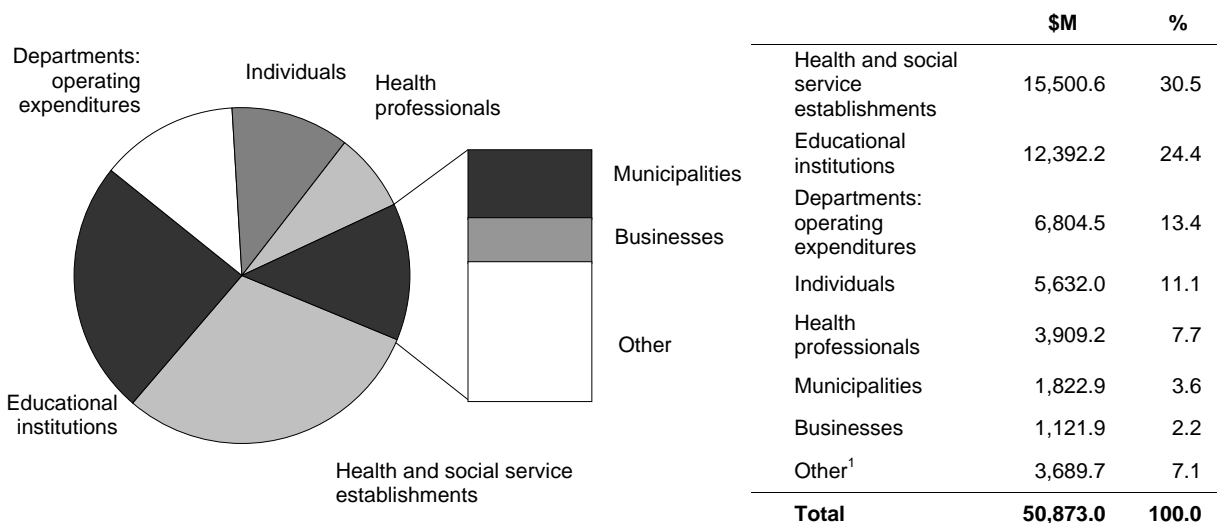
Departmental operating expenditures, at \$6,804.5 million, make up 13.4% of program spending.

Expenditures for individuals account for \$5,632.0 million, or 11.1% of program spending.

Remuneration of health professionals amounts to \$3,909.2 million and represents 7.7% of program spending.

Expenditures allocated to various other beneficiaries, including municipalities, businesses, non-profit organizations, and government corporations and agencies total \$6,634.5 million, or 12.9% of program spending.

Remuneration Expenditures

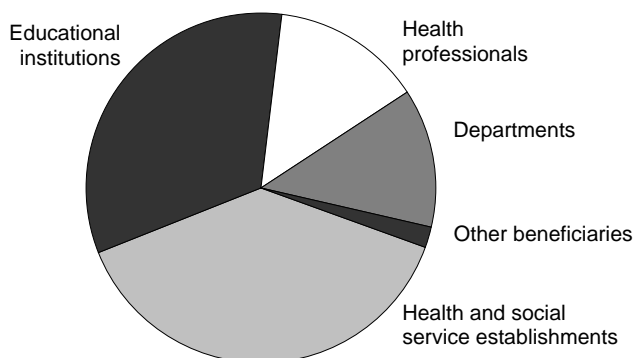
Forecast remuneration expenditures amount to \$28,479.3 million in 2006-2007, or 56.0% of program spending:

- Health and social service establishments and educational institutions respectively account for 39.6% and 33.2% of the total remuneration expenditures;
- Health professionals receive 13.7% of remuneration expenditures while the share of department personnel is 11.7%.

Remuneration expenditures increase by \$1,321.3 million in 2006-2007. This growth is divided between sectors as follows:

- In the health and social services sector, remuneration expenditures increase by \$936.1 million over the 2005-2006 fiscal year. This growth is mainly attributable to the provision created for pay equity, salary adjustments and other improvements in the working conditions of employees in the network, and to the planned increases in expenditures for health professionals;
- In the education networks, the increase of \$419.5 million is the result of the provision created for pay equity, additional resources for students who are handicapped or have adjustment or learning difficulties, salary adjustments for employees in the networks, the agreement respecting teachers' remuneration based on the recognition of 40 hours per week, and the 90-minute increase in teaching time per week in the elementary sector.

- The remuneration expenditures under Departments and Other beneficiaries decline by \$34.3 million. This decrease is attributable in part to the impact of the non-replacement of one of every 10 retirees on average.

Operating Expenditures

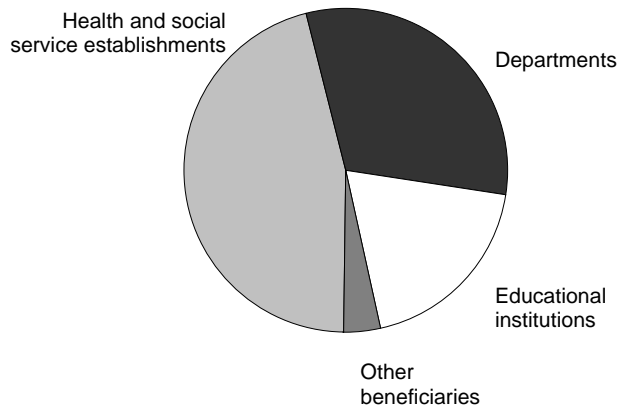
Operating expenditures stand at \$7,289.5 million in 2006-2007, compared to \$6,999.2 million in 2005-2006, and break down as follows:

- 45.9% or \$3,347.5 million for health and social service establishments;
- 31.6% or \$2,299.9 million allocated to the departments;
- 19.0% or \$1,386.2 million for educational institutions;
- 3.5% or \$255.9 million for other beneficiaries.

Operating expenditures are \$290.3 million higher in 2006-2007 than 2005-2006. This increase is mainly the result of the following variations:

- In the health and social services sector, an increase of \$207.9 million resulting in large part from funding the growth in the cost of services to the population and the indexation of other expenditures;
- In the education sector, an increase of \$92.8 million resulting in part from additional needs related to the growth in clientele in the university network and the indexation of other expenditures.

Capital Expenditures

Forecast capital expenditures total \$2,086.9 million in 2006-2007, or \$164.5 million more than in the previous fiscal year.

The health and social services and education networks account for a large portion of the capital expenditures:

- 15.7% or \$327.7 million for health and social service establishments;
- 25.9% or \$540.6 million for educational institutions.

Capital expenditures are allocated according to the three avenues of intervention used by the government: capital expenditures allocated to special funds, repayment of principal, and subsidized fixed assets.

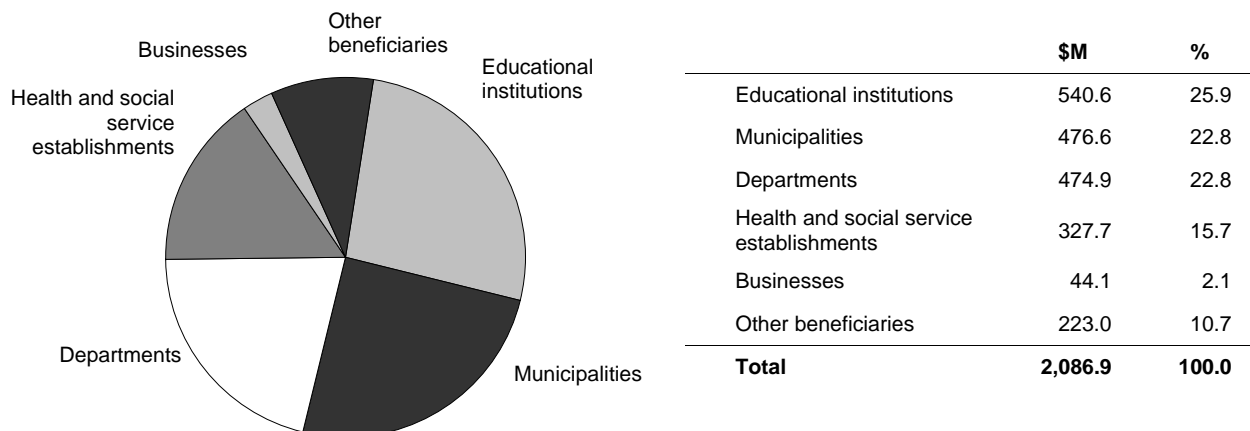
Capital Expenditures Allocated to Special Funds

Capital expenditures allocated to the special funds account for 22.8% of the total capital expenditures in 2006-2007.

The amounts allocated for the funds' capital expenditures are up \$64.5 million, from \$410.4 million in 2005-2006 to \$474.9 million in 2006-2007.

The main reason for this variation is an increase of \$69.4 million in the government's capital expenditure contribution to the Road Network Preservation and Improvement Fund, the purpose of which is to preserve pavements and structures, and to improve and develop the road network.

Forecast Capital Expenditures in 2006-2007 by Beneficiary



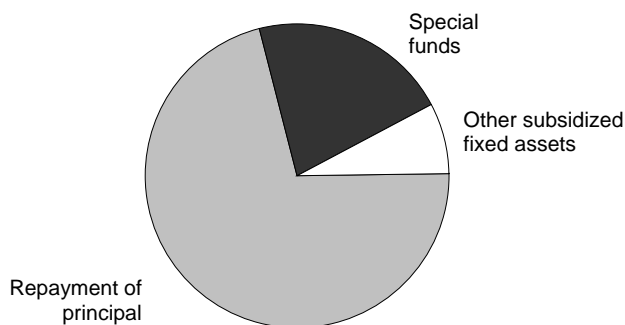
Expenditures for Repayment of Principal

Expenditures for repayment of the principal on the subsidized debt represent 70.1% of the total capital expenditures in 2006-2007.

These expenditures rise from \$1,367.1 million in 2005-2006 to \$1,463.9 million in 2006-2007. The main reasons for this increase of \$96.8 million are as follows:

- An increase of \$28.1 million in the “Affaires municipales et Régions” portfolio, attributable to the funds required to fulfil the government’s water purification commitments;
- In the health and social services sector, an increase of \$27.1 million, due mainly to the construction work done in connection with the investment plans for health and social service establishments;
- An increase of \$23.6 million in the “Éducation, Loisir et Sport” portfolio, reflecting the funding of authorized investments in the networks;
- An increase of \$18.2 million to cultural government corporations, mainly attributable to the completion of construction work on the Grande Bibliothèque.

Subsidized Fixed Assets

Subsidies for fixed assets account for 7.1% of the total capital expenditures in 2006-2007.

These subsidies rise from \$144.9 million in 2005-2006 to \$148.1 million in 2006-2007, an increase of \$3.2 million. The subsidies are primarily intended for businesses and municipalities, which account for 59.6% of these expenditures.

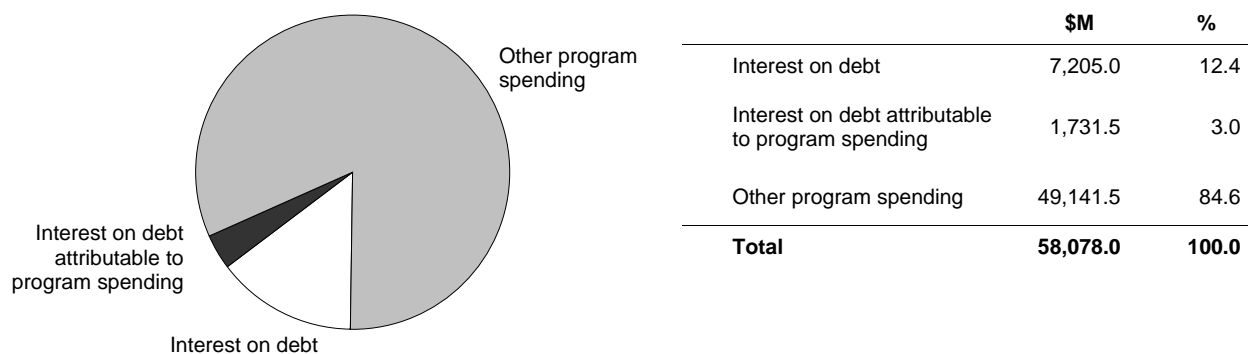
Interest expenditures by the government amount to \$8,936.5 million for the 2006-2007 fiscal year, compared to \$8,562.6 million the previous fiscal year.

Interest expenditures by the government break down as follows:

- 12.4% or \$7,205.0 million for forecast interest expenditures on the debt of the consolidated revenue fund;
- 3.0% or \$1,731.5 million for expenditures allocated to servicing the debt attributable to program spending.

Interest expenditures represent 15.4% of the Government's total expenditures planned for 2006-2007.

Interest on the Debt of the Consolidated Revenue Fund

Interest expenditures on the debt of the consolidated revenue fund amount to \$7,205.0 million in 2006-2007, and include finance charges of \$4,546.0 million attributable to the direct debt and finance charges of \$2,659.0 million attributable to the retirement plans account.

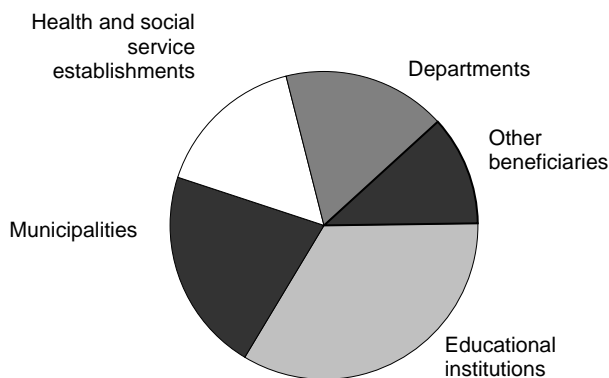
Interest expenditures on the debt of the consolidated revenue fund are \$356.0 million higher than in the previous fiscal year. This increase is largely due to the expected rise in interest rates.

Interest on the Debt Attributable to Program Spending

Interest on the debt attributable to program spending amounts to \$1,731.5 million for the 2006-2007 fiscal year, compared to \$1,713.6 million in 2005-2006, an increase of \$17.9 million.

This growth is notably due to an increase of \$32.3 million attributable mainly to funding the investments made by the Road Network Preservation and Improvement Fund, and to reductions in other departments.

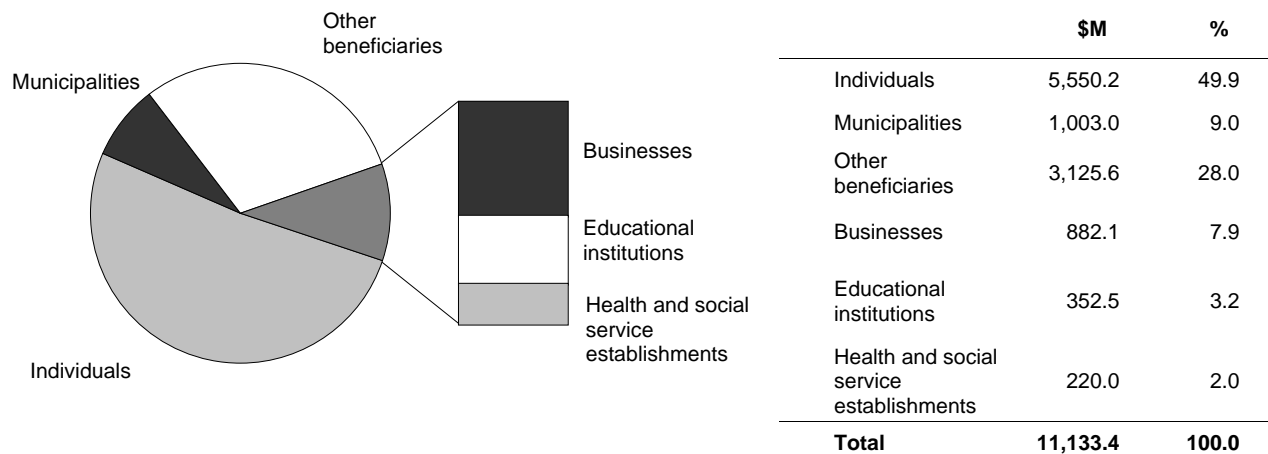
Support Expenditures

Support expenditures encompass support and assistance programs intended mainly for individuals, non-profit organizations, businesses and municipalities. Half of the support expenditures are paid to individuals.

Support expenditures amount to \$11,133.4 million in 2006-2007, which is \$461.1 million higher than in 2005-2006. This increase is divided between the following elements:

- In the “Affaires municipales et Régions” portfolio, an increase of \$60.0 million mainly to enable the Government to fulfil its commitments under the Compensations in lieu of Taxes program and financial measures set out in the Entente financière et fiscale, which was extended in 2006 with full indexation. An additional amount of \$8.0 million is also allocated to the Regional Development Fund for the operations of the regional conference of elected representatives;
- In the “Agriculture, Pêcheries et Alimentation” portfolio, an increase of \$16.3 million essentially attributable to the increase in the funds granted for the Refund of Property Taxes and Compensations to Agricultural Operations;
- In the “Éducation, Loisir et Sport” portfolio, an increase of \$68.6 million mainly attributable to the Financial Assistance for Education Program pursuant to the increase in the amount of bursaries as a result of the agreement entered into with the student federations in April 2005, and to an increase of \$14.8 million in the subsidy for school transportation;

Support Expenditures by Beneficiary in 2006-2007



- In the “Famille, Aînés et Condition féminine” portfolio, an increase of \$92.9 million notably as a result of the annualization of the cost of reduced-contribution childcare places that were developed during the 2005-2006 fiscal year;
- In the “Santé et Services sociaux” portfolio, an increase of \$145.5 million primarily attributable to the Prescription Drug Insurance Program and to the increase in subsidies to community organizations, family resources and for emergency pre-hospital services.

Expenditures Related to the Provision for Bad Debts and Other Provisions

The Bad Debts and Other supercategory includes the expenditures related to the variation in the provision for bad debts and the provision for losses on financial interventions guaranteed by the government. For the 2006-2007 fiscal year, these expenditures stand at \$374.6 million, compared to \$474.6 million for 2005-2006.

In 2006-2007, expenditures related to the change in the provision for bad debts total \$298.4 million, down \$121.5 million from the previous fiscal year. This provision is intended to maintain the government's balanced budget by allowing for probable future losses on normal receivables. This decrease is essentially attributable to the "Revenu" portfolio, the provision for which was revised upwards by \$258.0 million in 2005-2006.

The expenditures related to the provision for losses on financial interventions guaranteed by the Government, excluding an exceptional amount of \$82.0 million from the probable expenditure of the Ministère du Développement économique, de l'Innovation et de l'Exportation, rise by \$21.5 million to reach \$76.2 million in 2006-2007.

- A large part of this increase is to be found in the "Développement économique, Innovation et Exportation" portfolio following the new interventions planned under the Strategic Support for Investment Program.

Appendix 3.1

Nature of the Expenditure Categories Presented in This Chapter

Remuneration

Remuneration expenditures encompass the salaries of health professionals and employees of the health and social services network, the education networks and the public service, employer contributions to the retirement plans and employer contributions paid to the various established government plans and the group insurance plan.

Operating

Operating and other expenditures include the support and administrative expenditures of departments and agencies, including the Contingency Fund, those of the health and social services network and those of the education networks. Also included are expenditures related to depreciation of fixed assets of departments and agencies.

Capital

Capital expenditures include subsidized fixed assets and allocations to special funds for the purposes of the commitments associated with their fixed assets. The government subsidizes, as the case may be, the cost of the beneficiaries' fixed assets or repayment of the principal amount of loans contracted by its partners.

Expenditures for the repayment of principal cover the funding of the government's share with respect to the fixed assets subsidized by the debt service. This type of intervention applies to capital expenditures by school boards, CEGEPs, universities, and health and social service establishments, by municipalities (in the case of public transportation and sewage treatment) and by cultural institutions in the case of cultural facilities.

For these sectors, completed capital spending projects are financed by long-term borrowing. The repayment schedule, as the case may be, may extend over a 25-year period. To cover its share, the government undertakes to repay all or part of the principal.

Interest

Interest expenditures include expenditures allocated to service the subsidized debt, recognitions in program spending, and expenditures to pay interest on the government debt.

Support

Support expenditures include various other subsidies intended to provide various forms of financial assistance to individuals, businesses, government and parapublic agencies and other government partners.

- In the “Santé et Services sociaux” portfolio, the health assistance and prescription drug insurance programs administered by the Régie de l'assurance maladie du Québec and assistance to family resources, assistance to community organizations and auxiliary grants for the health and social services network;
- In the “Éducation, Loisir et Sport” portfolio, the school transportation assistance program and the financial assistance to education program;
- In the “Emploi et Solidarité sociale” portfolio, financial assistance measures and employment assistance measures;
- In the “Famille, Aînés et Condition féminine” portfolio, support for childcare centres and other childcare services.

In the other portfolios, they include programs such as:

- The assistance for social housing and home improvement assistance programs administered by Société d'habitation du Québec;
- Financial compensation programs at the Ministère des Affaires municipales et des Régions;
- Financial support for farmers and bio-food company assistance programs at the Ministère de l'Agriculture, des Pêcheries et de l'Alimentation;
- Financial support program for the manufacturing and trade sectors, the development of foreign trade, and financial support for the development of research and innovation at the Ministère du Développement économique, de l'Innovation et de l'Exportation;
- Assistance programs to municipalities for public transportation at the Ministère des Transports.

CHAPTER 4

PUBLIC SERVICE STAFF LEVEL

IN BRIEF

- For the second consecutive year, the staff level reduction target was achieved.
 - The public service staff level¹ stands at 73,290 FTEs² compared to 74,400 FTEs in 2004-2005, a decrease of 1,110 FTEs;
 - In two years, the public service staff level has declined by 2,510 FTEs compared to the reduction target of 2,035 FTEs.
- The target for reducing the size of government in 2006-2007 is 1,211 FTEs.
- The authorized staff level envelopes forecast for departments and budget-funded agencies appearing in the 2006-2007 Expenditure Budget and for government corporations and extrabudgetary agencies whose personnel is subject to the Public Service Act (R.S.Q., c. F-3.1.1) have been adjusted in the same proportions as the reduction resulting from the non-replacement of one out of every two retirees on average during the 2005-2006 fiscal year.

Towards Smaller Government

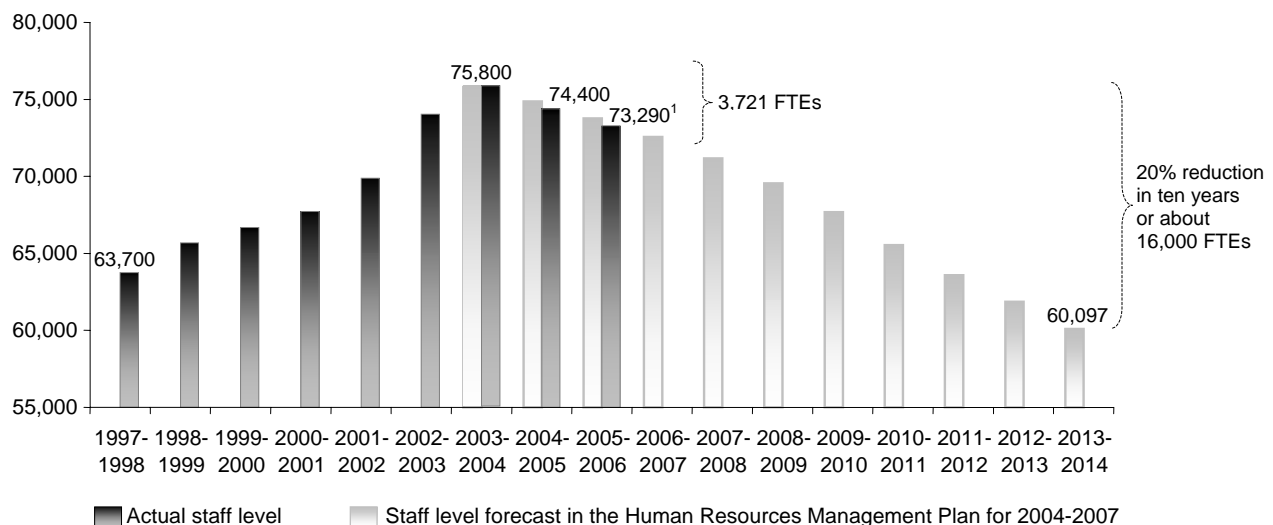
The Government announced in its 2004-2007 Modernisation Plan and reiterated in the Human Resources Management Plan for 2004-2007 its intention not to replace one out of every two retirees on average, which will reduce the number of public servants by 20% over a ten-year period beginning in 2004-2005.

For the 2005-2006 fiscal year, the reduction target was 1,109 FTEs utilized. This objective was achieved. The utilized staff level in 2005-2006 was 73,290 FTEs¹, a drop of 1,110 FTEs from the utilized staff level in 2004-2005.

Overall, the reduction achieved in the first two years of the plan to reduce the size of government was 2,510 FTEs versus the target of 2,035 FTEs, which represents an additional decrease of 475 FTEs.

In 2006-2007, the target for reducing the size of government is 1,211 FTEs, for a cumulative reduction of 3,721 FTEs.

Variations in the Authorized Staff Level Envelope

At each fiscal year, the Conseil du trésor determines an authorized staff level envelope for each department and budget-funded agency including, as necessary, special funds, as well as for government corporations and extrabudgetary agencies whose personnel is subject to the Public Service Act (R.S.Q., c. F-3.1.1).

Departments and Agencies Appearing in the 2006-2007 Expenditure Budget

The 2005-2006 comparative staff level appearing in the 2006-2007 Expenditure Budget is 59,418 FTEs, which is 840 FTEs more than the level forecast in the 2005-2006 Expenditure Budget. Most of this increase is divided between the following departments and agencies:

- 678 FTEs at the Sûreté du Québec, including the Police Services Fund, stemming mainly from adjustments following the police reorganization;
- 145 FTEs at the Ministère du Revenu, primarily to step up efforts to combat the underground economy and to revise the systems used to administer the G.S.T.

The envelope forecast for 2006-2007 is 56,813 FTEs, which is less than the 2005-2006 comparative level due to:

- Transfers of responsibilities mainly to the Centre de services partagés du Québec and Services Québec, and the change in status of the Régie du bâtiment du Québec into an extrabudgetary agency, for a total of 1,833 FTEs;
- The non-replacement of one out of every two retirees on average in 2005-2006 and other variations, for 772 FTEs.

Government Corporations and Extrabudgetary Agencies Whose Personnel is Subject to the Public Service Act

The total staff level envelope forecast for government corporations and extrabudgetary agencies has increased by 1,624 FTEs since the beginning of 2005-2006 Expenditure Budget, due mainly to:

- An increase of 1,833 FTEs, largely resulting from transfers to new agencies, the Centre de services partagés du Québec and Services Québec, and the change in status of the Régie du bâtiment du Québec;
- A reduction of 209 FTEs, resulting from the non-replacement of one out of every two retirees on average in 2005-2006 and other variations.

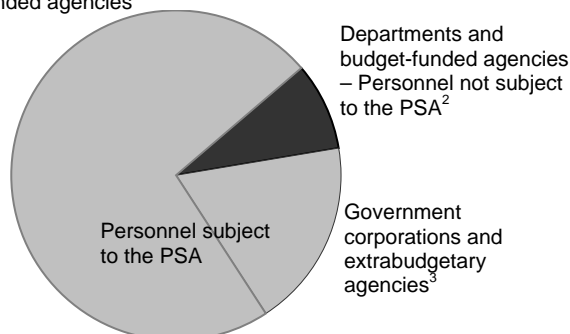
The public service staff level comprises the personnel working for government departments, agencies and corporations subject to the Public Service Act.

For certain budget-funded agencies, it also includes personnel not subject to the Public Service Act, such as Sûreté du Québec police officers, judges, Attorney General's prosecutors as well as personnel of the Commission des droits de la personne et des droits de la jeunesse, the Conseil des services essentiels and the Public Protector.

This staff level does not include students and interns.

Appendix 4.2

Definitions

Utilized staff level: Number of regular and casual employees, expressed in FTEs, who have actually been remunerated.

Total staff level envelope or Total authorized staff level forecast: Maximum number of permanent and casual employees, expressed in FTEs, who can be remunerated. The Conseil du trésor sets the annual authorized staff level envelope for each department, agency and, as necessary, special funds.

Full-time equivalent (FTE): An FTE represents the ratio between the work of an employee over the year and the work of an employee who has worked full-time over the year.

For example, the FTE of a person who occupies a full-time position and who worked for the full year is equivalent to 1. The FTE of a person who worked part time, reduced hours or for part of the year only varies between 0 and 1. Finally, the FTE of a person who was on unpaid leave of absence for the entire year is equal to 0.

CHAPTER 5

FORECAST PUBLIC INVESTMENTS IN FIXED ASSETS IN 2006-2007

IN BRIEF

- The government is continuing to increase public investments in preservation of fixed assets and plans to allocate \$1,668.7 million in 2006-2007 to keep public infrastructure in good condition, including \$1,097.3 million for the health and social services, education and culture networks and \$571.4 million for the road network.
- An amount of \$2,356.4 million will be allocated to the performance of new priority projects, mainly over the next three years, \$1,479.3 million of which will go to public transportation, including \$886.0 million for replacement of Métro cars put into service in the 60s, \$484.9 million to the health and social service sector and \$301.7 million to the education sector.
- In 2006-2007, the total public investments to be realized by the government is \$4,724.9 million, namely:
 - \$2,386.1 million for health and social service establishments, educational institutions, the municipal infrastructures, cultural institutions, research infrastructures, public transportation and the development of educational childcare services;
 - \$1,469.4 million through special funds, primarily the Road Network Preservation and Improvement Fund;
 - \$565.9 million through extrabudgetary agencies;
 - \$303.5 million through departments and budget-funded agencies.

New Public Infrastructure Investments

In 2006-2007, the government will continue its efforts aimed at public infrastructure renewal and the implementation of new investment projects.

Priority Maintained Regarding Investments in Preservation of Fixed Assets

We should remember that during the period from 2001-2002 to 2004-2005, investments in preservation of fixed assets in the health and social service, education and cultural sectors amounted to \$600.0 million per year, on the average.

In 2005-2006, the government proceeded with a major increase in the investments allocated to renewal of public infrastructure and improvement of the quality of services.

Particularly concerning the health and social service, education and cultural sectors, \$1,097.3 million will be allocated in 2006-2007 to keep infrastructure in good condition. Investments will have almost doubled compared to the period from 2001-2002 to 2004-2005.

Including \$571.4 million in preservation of fixed assets through work performed on the road network, \$5,196.1 million will be allocated to the priority of keeping the public infrastructure in good condition over the next three years, including \$1,668.7 million in 2006-2007.

Additional Priority Development Projects

The government forecasts that its contribution to the implementation of priority public investment projects, mainly over the next three years, will total \$2,356.4 million, namely:

- \$1,479.3 million for public transportation infrastructure, particularly for the replacement of Métro cars put into service in the 60s (\$886.0 million), for the renovation of the Montréal Métro and for commuter train projects. These investments include \$163.3 million in funding from the Société de financement des infrastructures locales du Québec (SoFIL);
- \$484.9 million for health and social service establishments, particularly to carry out construction and renovation projects on the establishments of that network. Investments will also be allocated to emergency room improvements and to the purchase of medical equipment, notably radiation oncology and cardiology equipment. Among other purpose, this contribution will make it possible to develop the Health Infoway, at an estimated aggregate cost of \$547.0 million;
- \$301.7 million for educational institutions, particularly for the conversion of science laboratories in the 2nd cycle at the secondary level;
- \$195.6 million for research infrastructures, including projects selected under programs of the Canada Foundation for Innovation and the Research Support Program;
- \$58.2 million for cultural facilities, particularly to accompany the government's partners in the development of religious heritage and cultural facilities.

Forecast Total Public Investments in 2006-2007

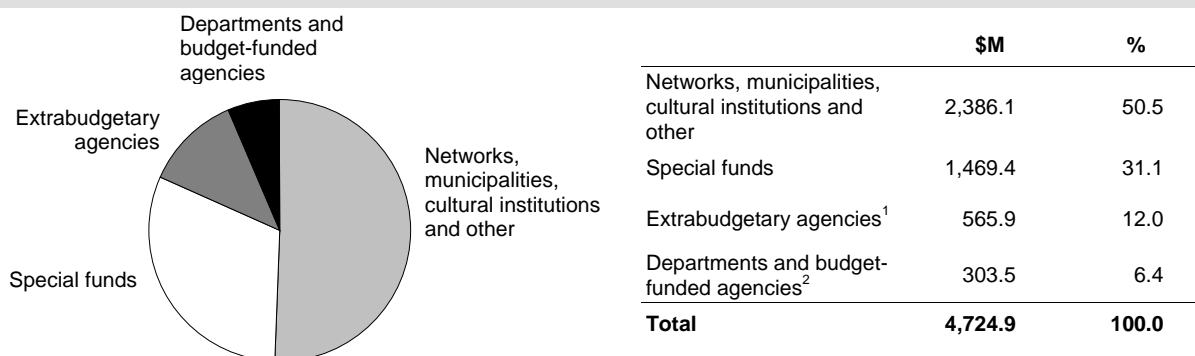
The contribution of the government to the public investments forecast in 2006-2007 amounts to \$4.7 billion.

- The forecast investments in the health and social service sector, in the education networks and in municipalities, cultural institutions, educational childcare services, public transportation and the research sector represent a total of \$2,386.1 million, or 50.5%;
- The forecast investments in special funds account for 31.1%, or \$1,469.4 million, while those of extrabudgetary agencies are 12.0%, or \$565.9 million and those of the departments represent 6.4%, or \$303.5 million.

The evolution and type of public investments in fixed assets are respectively presented in Appendices 5.1 and 5.2.

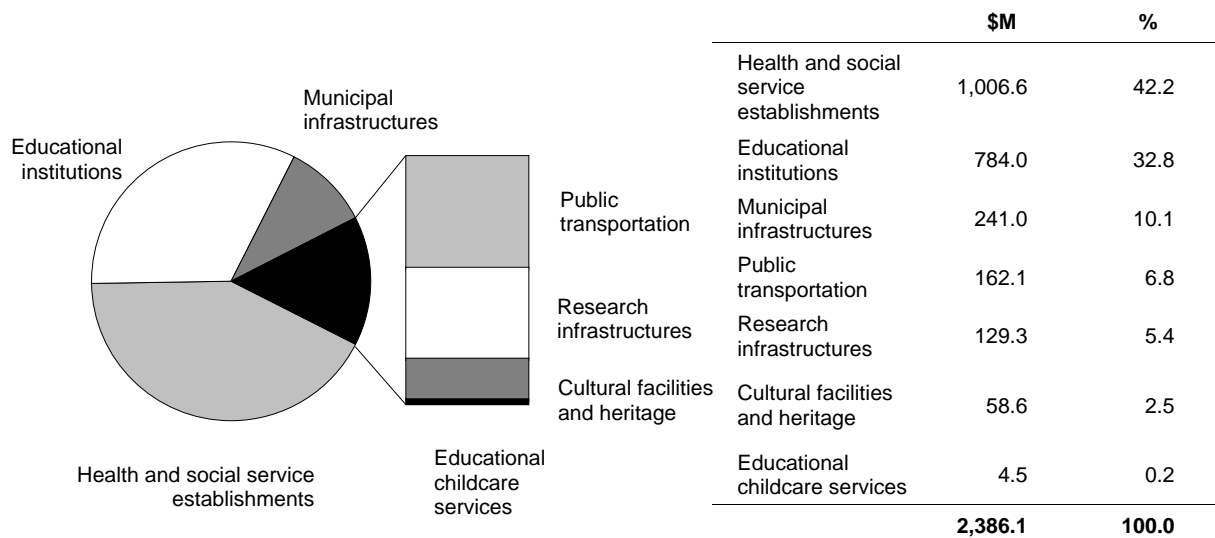
Government Investments in Networks, Municipalities, Cultural Institutions and Other

The forecast investments in networks, municipalities, cultural institutions and other entities not included in the government reporting entity amount to \$2,386.1 million in 2006-2007.

Each year, the departments concerned submit three-year capital budget plans to the Conseil du trésor. These plans indicate the costs related to the completion of the projects authorized previously, asset preservation needs and the cost of new initiatives.

These investments are financed by means of long-term loans contracted by the networks, municipalities, cultural institutions and other entities outside the government reporting entity. The government's contribution takes the form of a total or partial assumption of their debt service, spread over a term of up to 25 years.

Health and social service establishments

In 2006-2007, the forecast aggregate investments in this sector amount to \$1,006.6 million.

Moreover, total investments in preservation of fixed assets are \$458.5 million in 2006-2007

Educational institutions

The forecast investments in this sector amount to \$784.0 million in 2006-2007, compared to \$860.4 million in 2005-2006. This decrease of \$76.4 million is particularly explained by the end of certain projects, including those related to the different university faculties of medicine.

Municipal infrastructures

In 2006-2007, the forecast investments are \$241.0 M, compared to \$285.4 million in 2005-2006.

Starting in 2006-2007, the Société de financement des infrastructures locales du Québec (SoFIL) will invest in municipal infrastructures.

Public transportation

In 2006-2007, the forecast investments in this sector are \$162.1 million, compared to \$89.7 million in 2005-2006. This \$72.4-million increase is particularly explained by the cost of work on Phase 2 of the renovation of the Montréal Métro and the development of reserved bus lanes within the territory of the Société de transport de Montréal.

These forecasts exclude the investments of the Agence métropolitaine de transport, which are discussed in the section on extrabudgetary agencies.

Research infrastructures

The forecast investments in 2006-2007 amount to \$129.3 million, compared to \$52.6 million last year. The Research Support Program and the projects jointly funded with the Canada Foundation for Innovation will benefit from these additional amounts.

Cultural facilities and heritage

The forecast investments in 2006-2007 are estimated at \$58.6 million, compared to \$57.8 million in 2005-2006. A recurring amount of \$15.0 million per year is allocated to the Policy on Reading and Books.

These forecasts exclude the investments of government corporations reporting to the Minister of Culture and Communications, which are considered in the section of this chapter on extrabudgetary agencies.

Educational childcare services

In 2006-2007, the government is ending the development of new places in educational childcare services and forecasts investments of \$4.5 million in this sector.

These investments will make it possible to complete the development of 200,000 places in reduced-contribution childcare services.

Public Investments in Special Funds

The forecast investments in special funds total \$1,469.4 million in 2006-2007, compared to \$1,317.7 million in 2005-2006, a variation of \$151.7 million compared to the previous year.

- In 2006-2007, the forecast investments by the Road Network Preservation and Improvement Fund amount to \$1,197.2 million compared to \$1,088.2 million in 2005-2006. The investments of this fund correspond to work on preservation of roadways and structures and on improvement and development of the road network.
 - \$571.4 million will be allocated to the rehabilitation of about 1,500 kilometres and interventions on 380 structures, \$407.6 million to development of the road network translating into major work, particularly on Autoroutes 20 and 50 and on Highways 175 and 185 and, finally, \$218.2 million to improvement of the road network, particularly with regard to safety.
- The forecast level of investments in the information technology funds in 2006-2007 is \$121.6 million, slightly higher than in 2005-2006.
- The investments of the Land Information Fund amount to \$44.8 million, an increase of \$1.2 million in relation to 2005-2006.
- The forecast investments in the other special funds are higher than those of the previous year, growing from \$66.3 million in 2005-2006 to \$105.8 million in 2006-2007, for a net increase of \$39.5 million. This is explained, in particular, by a \$14.3-million increase in the Police Services Fund of the Ministère de la Sécurité publique for the purchase of equipment.

Contribution of the Government to Public Investments of Extrabudgetary Agencies

The investment forecasts of the extrabudgetary agencies total \$565.9 million in 2006-2007 compared to \$590.9 million in 2005-2006, for a decrease of \$25.0 million.

The agencies making the biggest investments in 2006-2007 are the Agence métropolitaine de transport with \$220.0 million, the Société immobilière du Québec with \$134.1 million, the Centre de services partagés du Québec with \$76.4 million and the government corporations in the cultural field with \$22.8 million.

Public Investments in the Departments

The forecast public investments in the departments amount to \$303.5 million in 2006-2007, compared to \$328.9 million in 2005-2006:

- “Transports”: investments of \$45.4 million, mainly for the acquisition of material and equipment;
- “Sécurité publique”: investments of \$31.9 million, \$10.4 million of which is allocated to the operations of the Sûreté du Québec, particularly to renew the motor vehicle fleet;
- “Éducation, Loisir et Sport”: investments of \$31.6 million, allocated, in particular, to informational resources projects;
- “Ressources naturelles et Faune”: investments of \$30.6 million, allocated, in particular, to preservation of fixed assets;
- “Développement durable, Environnement et Parcs”: investments of \$24.2 million, nearly half of which is allocated to repair work on public dams;
- “Services gouvernementaux”: investments of \$22.1 million, mainly attributable to the development of projects related to e-Government.

Evolution of Public Investments

Public investments grew from \$3,174.7 million in 2001-2002 to \$4,646.4 million in 2005-2006.

In 2006-2007, the forecast growth is 1.7%, or \$78.5 million, the result of the increase in investments in preservation of fixed assets begun in 2005-2006 and the implementation of priority projects that represent total investments of near \$2.4 billion.

Appendix 5.2

Nature of the Investments Considered in this Chapter

The data on public investments presented in this chapter are divided into four categories:

- Investments made by entities outside the government reporting entity but which depend on government financial assistance: the health and social service network, the education networks, municipalities, non-governmental institutions, generally in the cultural field, such as libraries, museums and concert halls, or in the area of preservation of religious heritage, dioceses, parish councils or religious communities, the development of educational childcare services; the research sector and, finally, the public transportation sector.
- Investments made by school boards, CEGEPs and universities mainly concern the expansion, renovation, rehabilitation and construction of schools or teaching facilities and the acquisition of furniture, equipment and apparatus required for the operation of the buildings.
- Investments made in the health and social service network concern the construction, expansion, renovation and rehabilitation of hospitals, long-term care centres, rehabilitation centres and CLSCs, acquisition of furniture and medical and non-medical equipment, and development and purchasing of computer systems.
- Investments in municipal infrastructures mainly concern construction, rehabilitation or expansion of infrastructures, urban renewal of neighbourhoods and beautification of village cores. Also included are construction of sewage treatment plants and sewage interceptors and rehabilitation of sewer systems leading to sewage treatment plants, as well as aqueduct and sewer projects. These investments include the Canada-Québec Infrastructure Program and the Québec-Municipalities Infrastructure Works Program, intended to enable municipalities to replace or improve water and sewer infrastructure.
- Investments in public transportation correspond, among other purposes, to the purchase of urban buses, work relating to Métro infrastructure maintenance, including rehabilitation of stations and replacement of escalators, development of reserved bus lanes and incentive parking lots, and maintenance and development of commuter trains.

- Fixed asset projects for which the debt service is subsidized by the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications particularly include construction, expansion and renovation projects for public libraries, concert halls, archive centres, museums and performing arts centres, religious heritage rehabilitation and preservation projects, and projects related to the Policy on Reading and Books.
 - Research infrastructures concern investments relating to infrastructure development in the fields of research, science, technology and innovation. These capital investments are particularly made in the health and postsecondary education sectors and in research centres.
 - Investments relating to educational childcare services seek to develop and promote access to quality educational childcare services.
- Investments by the various special funds administered by the departments, a substantial portion of which concerns the road network.
 - Investments by government agencies not appearing in Volume II of the 2006-2007 Expenditure Budget but whose financial statements are consolidated with those of the government. These are capital investments of extrabudgetary agencies, such as government corporations in the cultural field and the Agence métropolitaine de transport.
 - Investments in the departments allocated to their capital appropriations.

The investments of government corporations are not discussed in this chapter.

CHAPTER 6

RESULTS OF CONSOLIDATED ENTITIES

IN BRIEF

- The government's total expenditures for the 2006-2007 fiscal year will be \$58,078.0 million before consolidation.
- Consolidation of the consolidated entities, i.e. expenditures of extrabudgetary agencies, special funds and defined-purpose accounts, will add \$3,637.9 million to the government's expenditures, resulting in total consolidated expenditures of \$61,715.9 million.
- When the consolidated revenues of \$3,814.9 million are considered, consolidation of the results of consolidated entities has a positive net impact of \$177.0 million on the government's results for the fiscal year 2006-2007.

Consolidated Government Expenditures

Consolidated government expenditures will total \$61,715.9 million in 2006-2007. This includes program spending and debt service as well as the impact of consolidation of expenditures of extrabudgetary agencies, special funds and defined-purpose accounts.

For 2006-2007 the impact of consolidation of expenditures of consolidated entities will be \$3,637.9 million, \$3,245.0 million of which is for consolidation expenditures of extra-budgetary agencies and special funds, and \$392.9 million is for expenditures of defined-purpose accounts.

Consolidated government expenditures for the 2006-2007 fiscal year are \$2,541.1 million higher than those forecast for 2005-2006, due in particular to:

- A \$1,933.0-million increase in program spending;
- A \$356.0-million increase in debt service;
- A \$458.0-million increase in consolidated expenditures for extra-budgetary agencies and special funds;
- A \$205.9-million reduction in consolidated expenditures for defined-purpose accounts.

The government's primary accounting policies with regard to consolidation of the extrabudgetary agencies, special funds and defined-purpose accounts are presented in Appendix 6.1.

Evolution of Forecast Results of Consolidated Entities in 2005-2006

Since the 2005-2006 Expenditure Budget was tabled, the results forecast before consolidation adjustments which are made in order to avoid accounting twice for the expenditures of consolidated entities and departments and organizations were revised upward by \$312.3 million, going from a \$11.0-million deficit to a \$301.3-million surplus.

The net forecast results, after consolidation adjustments, are \$341.0 million compared to the \$267.0 million forecast in the 2005-2006 Expenditure Budget, a net variation of \$74.0 million.

The increase of net results of extrabudgetary agencies and special funds comes to \$269.2 million, mainly:

- \$138.6 million for Investissement Québec, primarily due to a \$133.0-million gain from selling its shares in the Québec-Cartier Mining Company;
- \$49.5 million for the Société de financement des infrastructures locales du Québec since the timeline for works was revised;
- \$20.3 million for the Land Information Fund, largely due to the reform of the Québec cadastral system and good performance by the real estate market.

For defined-purpose accounts, the 2005-2006 forecast shows a surplus of \$24.1 million compared to a forecast deficit of \$19.0 million at the beginning of the 2005-2006 fiscal year; this is an improvement of \$43.1 million. The effect of consolidation adjustments is to balance the budget for defined-purpose accounts.

Impact of Consolidation of Revenues and Expenditures of Consolidated Entities in 2006-2007

Gross revenues and expenditures of consolidated entities in 2006-2007 are \$18,912.6 million and \$19,041.5 million respectively before consolidation adjustments. After adjustments, their impact on the government's 2006-2007 revenues and expenditures are \$3,814.9 million and \$3,637.9 million respectively.

The overall net impact of consolidation of the results of consolidated entities on the government's results is \$177.0 million in 2006-2007, compared to \$341.0 million for 2005-2006. This decrease of \$164.0 million is due primarily to the non-recurring exceptional gain of \$138.6 million realized by Investissement Québec in 2005-2006 from selling its shares in the Québec-Cartier Mining Company.

Changes to extrabudgetary agencies, special funds and defined-purpose accounts are presented in Appendix 6.2.

Results from extrabudgetary agencies, special funds and defined-purpose accounts are presented in Appendix 6.3, 6.4 and 6.5 respectively, using their own particular accounting policies, i.e. before applying consolidation adjustments.

Results of Extrabudgetary Agencies in 2006-2007

In 2006-2007, forecast results of extrabudgetary agencies before consolidation adjustments represent a deficit of \$77.7 million, compared to a surplus of \$231.5 million in 2005-2006, or a decrease of \$309.2 million. This variation can largely be explained by the following factors:

- Investissement Québec presents a surplus of \$15.8 million for fiscal 2006-2007, compared to a surplus of \$163.4 million for the previous fiscal year, which represents a decrease of \$147.6 million.
 - This variation is mainly due to gains from selling its shares in the Québec-Cartier Mining Company in 2005-2006.
- The Société de financement des infrastructures locales du Québec forecasts a \$56.0-million deficit in 2006-2007, compared to a \$37.3-million surplus in 2005-2006, a decrease of \$93.3 million.
 - This variation is the result of postponing certain works in 2006-2007.

Results of Special Funds in 2006-2007

In 2006-2007, forecast results of special funds before consolidation adjustments anticipate a \$1.2 million deficit in the 2006-2007 fiscal year, compared to a \$45.7 million surplus in 2005-2006, a decrease of \$46.9 million.

The main reason for this variation is that the Land Information Fund anticipates a \$8.4-million surplus for the 2006-2007 fiscal year, compared to a surplus of \$30.6 million in 2005-2006, a decrease of \$22.2 million.

- The decrease in the Land Information Fund's surplus in 2006-2007 is explained by the expected drop in revenues from real estate activity, and the growth in expenditures due to higher costs of professional services and amortization expenses related to Québec cadastral system reform and the Enregistrement des droits d'intervention et de la tenure project.
- This Fund's surplus in 2005-2006 was largely due to the reform of the Québec cadastral system, as well as good performance by the real estate market.

Results of Defined-Purpose Accounts in 2006-2007

Defined-purpose accounts indicate a \$50.0-million deficit in the 2006-2007 fiscal year, compared to a \$24.1-million surplus in 2005-2006, a decrease of \$74.1 million.

The variation is mainly due to the fact that two accounts presenting surpluses in 2005-2006 now forecast a deficit in 2006-2007.

- The defined-purpose account for financing the Youth Action Strategy forecasts a surplus of \$7.4 million in 2005-2006 and a deficit of \$32.4 million in 2006-2007.
 - A new Youth Action Strategy will be tabled in 2006-2007. The strategy will be financed by accrued surpluses in the account.
- The defined-purpose account for Minority-language and second-language teaching forecasts a surplus of \$21.3 million in 2005-2006 and a deficit of \$9.6 million in 2006-2007. The 2006-2007 forecast deficit for this account will be financed out of its accrued surpluses.

Appendix 6.1

The Government's Reporting Entity

Consolidated government expenditures include, in addition to program spending and the debt service, expenditures incurred by extrabudgetary agencies, special funds and defined-purpose accounts.

Expenditures of the consolidated entities are added to those of the government after eliminating inter-entity transactions and harmonizing accounting policies, when necessary.

There are two kinds of consolidation adjustments:

- The first consists of eliminating concluded inter-entity transactions. These eliminations are necessary to avoid accounting for the same expenditure twice at the time of consolidation;
- The second type of adjustment results from harmonization of the accounting policies of extrabudgetary agencies and special funds with those of the government.

The purpose of consolidation is to combine all financial transactions and resources for which the government is responsible. This provides a comprehensive picture of government finances.

The government reporting entity encompasses not only the departments and agencies headed by a Minister and having budgets funded by appropriations voted by the National Assembly, but also all of the extrabudgetary agencies, special funds, defined-purpose accounts and corporations that are owned or controlled by the government.

Two methods of consolidation are used, depending on the type of entity involved:

- The first method, known as the full consolidation method, consists of adding up the accounts of the departments, extrabudgetary agencies, special funds and defined-purpose accounts line by line. This incorporates their financial transactions, such as the expenditures and debt of agencies, into the government's financial statements. This is the method used for entities listed in Appendix 6.3, 6.4 and 6.5;
- The second method, known as the modified equity method, applies to government corporations. It consists of adding the net results of these corporations (surplus or deficit) to the government's revenue. This method applies to the entities appearing in Appendix 6.6.

Full Consolidation Method

Three groups must be distinguished among the entities consolidated line by line: extrabudgetary agencies, special funds and defined-purpose accounts.

The government has created different types of agencies to implement its policies and to provide certain services to the public. While varying in size and status, these agencies, like boards, commissions and corporations, are all more autonomous than departments. The legislation delegates more extensive financial and operating powers to their management. These agencies have more latitude to establish their systems and practices. They can also resort to sources of financing outside the government. However, they come under the authority of a Minister, to whom they must account for all of their financial management.

Special funds are financial management tools that make it possible, in some situations, to administer the allocated resources by using management methods different from those of the departments. Some funds produce and supply goods or services and derive all or part of their financing from the sale of such goods and services.

- Extrabudgetary agencies and special funds depend on departments for their funding. This is why budgeting and management of the departmental budget envelopes consider the extrabudgetary agencies, the special funds and the department of the same portfolio, all at the same time. More specifically, the departmental budget envelopes are composed of:
 - The expenditures envelope prescribed in Volume II of the Expenditure Budget dealing with appropriations of the departments and agencies;
 - The net result of the extrabudgetary agencies and special funds, namely the difference between their revenue and expenditure.

A defined-purpose account is a financial management mechanism created by Order in Council under articles 6 and 7 of the Financial Administration Act (R.S.Q., c. A-6.001). It allows a department to make separate entries for amounts paid by third parties into the Consolidated Revenue Fund pursuant to a contract or agreement that dedicates the money to a particular purpose.

- Financial transactions that pass through a defined-purpose account are governed by all of the regulations, policies and directives applicable to transactions effected from a department's appropriations. In addition, expenditures of defined-purpose accounts are subject to audit by the Auditor General.
- Revenues and expenditures for defined-purpose accounts have been included in the government's consolidated financial statements since the 2003-2004 fiscal year.

It is up to each Minister to ensure that the financial situation of the consolidated entities under his or her responsibility do not have a negative impact on the government's financial results.

Modified Equity Method

Consolidation of the results of government corporations is considered only in the documents accompanying the Budget Speech because the results of government corporations are considered in the balancing of the government's budget.

It is important to note that health and social service establishments, educational institutions and property held by agencies performing fiduciary activities (Appendix 6.7) are not included in the government reporting entity.

Appendix 6.2

Changes to Consolidated Entities

Extrabudgetary agencies and special funds:

Compared to the 2005-2006 fiscal year, certain extrabudgetary agencies and special funds were added, or moved to new portfolios, while others changed names or are no longer included in the Expenditure Budget.

A plus sign (+) indicates that an extrabudgetary agency or a special fund has been added, while a minus sign (-) indicates that an extrabudgetary agency or a special fund has been taken away.

Culture et Communications

The Bibliothèque nationale du Québec will now be known as Bibliothèque et Archives nationales du Québec.

Développement économique, Innovation et Exportation

- (-) The Société de développement de la Zone de commerce international de Montréal à Mirabel ceased operations on December 13, 2005.

Services gouvernementaux

- (+) The Centre de services partagés du Québec and Services Québec have been added to this portfolio.
- (+) The Fonds du service aérien gouvernemental has been incorporated into the « Services gouvernementaux ».
- (-) The Fonds des services gouvernementaux, all except for the Fonds du service aérien gouvernemental, has been merged with the Centre de services partagés du Québec.
- (-) The Fonds de l'information gouvernementale has been merged with the Centre des services partagés du Québec.

Travail

- (+) The status of the Régie du bâtiment du Québec, formerly a budget-funded agency, was changed by law on December 1, 2005. It has now become an extrabudgetary agency.

Defined-purpose accounts:

Three new applications to the general account "Training, Partnership and Organization of Special events", have been approved: Conseil exécutif, Famille, Aînés et Condition féminine and Transports.

- The government's total expenditures are broken down into six major government missions, namely: Health and Social Services, Education and Culture, Economy and Environment, Support for Individuals and Families, Administration and Justice, and Debt Payment.
- Three missions account for nearly three quarters of total expenditures:
 - The Health and Social Services mission, is 37.9% of total expenditures;
 - The Education and Culture mission, representing 23.1% of total expenditures;
 - The Debt Payment mission, which accounts for 12.4% of total expenditures.
- The three other missions represent a little more than a quarter of total expenditures.

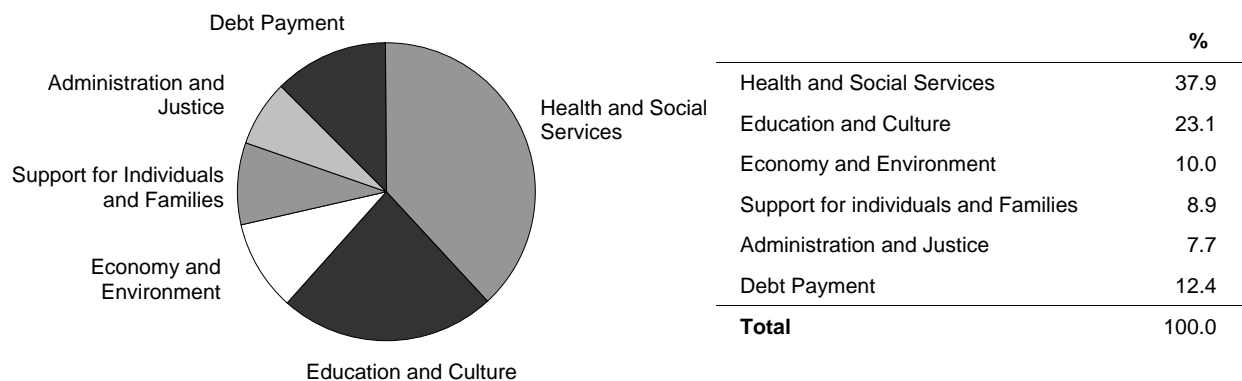
Expenditure Budget - Breakdown by Missions

The programs appearing in the 2006-2007 Expenditure Budget are broken down into six missions corresponding to the main functions of the government.
